# NEW BRIDGE TALKED OF.

County Thinking of Putting an Iron Bridge Between Houghton and Hancock.

PRESENT STRUCTURE A VERY RICKETY AFFAIR.

Open Range Lights Being Placed at the Mouth of Portage River, Keweenaw Peninsula.

The bridge that crosses Portage Lake is in bad condition. Every vehicle that passes over it causes the structure to sway badly and where half a dozen wagons pass over nearly together the motion of the bridge is decidedly alarming. Engineers say, however, that the bridge is not nearly in as crazy a condition as might be imagined by the timorous and that there is little immediate danger of its collapsing. It is material danger of its collapsing. It is patent to all though that the bridge must soon be rebuilt and the task is one which the county board will have to face in a yery short time. As previously stated in The Mining Journal, the county has accumulated a handsome surplus with an eye to building a new bridge although no resolution or formal advocacy of such a course has ever been word. Keeping a reserve of really urged. Keeping a reserve of nearly \$100,000 in the county treasury is like keeping a gold reserve of a thousand times that amount in the United States treasury—it is an unwritten law. The county is now in better shape financially than any other county in the state and the bridge can be built without a heavy additional tax. In fact a new bridge can probably be erected without

a cent of tax, the surplus sufficing to do

The bridge as it originally stood was begun in the spring of 1875 and was completed in the following winter, becompleted in the following winter, being opened to traffic in the spring of 1876. It was built and operated for many years by the Portage Lake Bridge company, passing into possession of the county by purchase some five years ago. The cost of the bridge as it originally stood was a trifle over \$47,000. A new turntable, costing a third of that sum was put in later, and is still in use, while the Mineral Range Railroad company spent some \$30,000 in raising the bridge and placing its tracks where they now run. The total cost of the bridge a strong backed Finn would care to attempt in these degenerate latter days. to date, exclusive of operating expenses, has probably exceeded \$100,000. The Mineral Range Railroad company made a contract some years ago with the company then owning the bridge, for the use of the structure for railroad purposes. It was contracted that the Mineral Range company should make all necessary alterations and repairs, and was to pay the company owning the bridge or its assigns the annual rental of \$2,500 a year, and keep its own portion of the bridge in repair. Since then the Hancock & Calumet road was built, and the cars and engines of that road have used the bridge as well as those of the Mineral Range company. An effort was made by the bridge company to compel additional payment for the additional road, but without success, the railroad people winning the suit.

THE SOLAR SYSTEM.

Vastness of Some of the Greater Stars of They Buy More Than the People of the Piciades.

If our sun were removed to the Pleiades it would hardly be visible in an opera glass with which nearly 100 stars can be seen in the cluster. Sixty or seventy Pleiades surpass our sun in brilliancy. Aleyon being 1,000 times more brilliant, Electra 500 times and Maia nearly 400, says Longman's Magazine. Sirins itself takes a subordinate rank when compared with the five most brilliant members of a group the real magnificance of which we can thus in some degree apprehend. If we seek to know the dimensions, not of the individual stars, but of the cluster itself, we are met with many difficulties but on the many difficulties but on the control of the cluster is self. Neptune, the most distant known member, has an orbit over 5,-000,000,000 miles across, but the solar system is to the Pleiades but a Liliputian to a Brobdingnagian-is but a microbe to a mountain-for a sphere the size of the solar system would, if it were spherical and its diameter that of the orbit of Neptune, be relatively so minute that it could be contained more than 400,000,000,000 times in a sphere the size of the Pleiades; in other words, the limits of the Pleiades could contain 150 solar systems as many times over as there are miles be tween Neptune and the sun. It must not be forgotten that though there are 2,300 stars in the cluster, yet with such dimensions for the entire group vast distances must separate the stars from one another.
