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



The Canadian restrictions on suffrage are peculiar. In order to be entitled to vote, not only must one be a male British subject, twenty-one years of age, and have lived in the dominion at least a year, but he must also have been the owner of real estate or the occupier of rented house or business property for the same time. If he owns real estate in a city it must be worth three hundred dollars, if in a town two hundred dollars and if elsewhere one hundred and fifty dollars. If he neither owns real estate nor occupies real estate as a tenant, he can vote if he earns three hundred dollars a year, or if he be the son of a farmer or real estate owner. and live at his father's home. An income voter is not required, as all other voters are, to live a year in the district where he wants to vote, but can register at any time. - Albany Times Union.

TRADITION OF THE HORSESHOE. How It Came to Be a Protection Against Evil Spirits.

In Morocco iron is considered a great protection against demons, who are the lineal representatives, after all, of the hostile spirits. Hence it is usual to place a knife or dagger under a sick man's pillow, his illness, of course, being attributed to demoniacal possession. In India, records a writer in Cornhill Magazine, the mourner who performs the necessary but somewha dangerous duty of putting fire into the dead man's mouth carries a key or a knife in his hand, to keep off the evil spirits. In short, a bit of iron is a very useful thing to have about you at any time if you desire to escape the un favorable attention of the ghosts, the trolls, the fairies and the demons gen erally. This is a good reason for buy-ing a pocketknife. It is also a reason for nailing up a horseshoe. "But why a horseshoe in particular?" you ask, "more than any other odd piece of iron?" Well, primarily, the good luck depends more upon the iron as iron than on the special shape or function of the horseshoe as a horseshoe. But there are also many reasons why

the superstition should happen to fix itself more particularly upon horse-shoes. We must remember that in Europe, at least, it is the eattle, the horses and the domestic beasts in general that are specially liable to the hostile attacks of "the little people." 

An old Indian, known to prospectors as "Figtree John," has for many years lived alone beside a large spring in the Colorado desert in San Diego county. His home is one of the most desolate and inaccessible spots on the earth's surface, and the last place one would expect to find a human being living in contentment. It is close to the Mexican line and about fifty miles east of the hills that form the western bound-

ary to the waste of white sand.

At all seasons of the year the heat is intolerable, and the awful hot wind blows day and night. Five yards from the spring in any direction there is not a living green thing in sight—only the blinding glare of the sandy plain stretching for miles on all sides until it joins the foothills in a shimmering purple haze.

Figtree John's place, however, is a tiny oasis of about two hundred square feet. The spring is a large one and the water pure and fresh when it bub bles from the earth. But it evaporates during the day almost as fast as it comes from the ground, so that the surface is only moistened for a small extent. On the edges of the spring grasses and weeds grow, and one large fig tree spreads its branches over th whole spot.
