

THE NEW PLAN DISCUSSED.

Secretary Carlisle Appears Before House Committee on Banking and Finance.

HIS PROPOSED CURRENCY PLAN EXPLAINED.

Advantages Over the National Banking Law Now in Force Discussed by the Secretary.

ENDORSED BY THE PRESIDENT.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Secretary Carlisle appeared before the house committee on banking and currency this morning to explain his currency plan as proposed in his annual report and endorsed by the president in his annual message.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The president issued a proclamation forfetting to the United States certain lands (about eight hundred and twenty-four acres) in the Sioux reservation in South Dakota alleged to have been earned by the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad from this city to the Black Hills for their failure to build within the required three years.

Johnson asked if the ultimate liability of the government would not inspire more confidence in the currency. The secretary said it undoubtedly would but his plan would ensure ample protection and therefore ample confidence.

Carlisle then took up section 11 of the state bank feature of his plan. He said as to this that he would consider such state bank notes safe—perhaps perfectly safe would be too strong—but reasonably safe. Johnson (O.) referred to the old wild cat days.

When the committee reconvened Comptroller of Currency Eckels appeared and made an elaborate statement of his views. He contended that national banking laws were not to be lightly dealt with and they should not be altered unless it was absolutely known that the change was to be beneficial.

The scheme which he suggested in his report was intended to disturb as little as possible the existing order of things. In order to make any system successful the note issuing must be immediately, not ultimately, convertible into coin.

BALTIC STREAMS. Influence of Current in the Skagerrack and North Sea.

Prof. Pettersson contributes a memoir on recent Swedish hydrographic research in the Baltic and North seas. These researches, the professor says, have thrown new light on the Baltic currents in the Skagerrack and North Sea.

In winter, when the outflowing current or Baltic stream is reduced to its minimum by the freezing of the rivers, it shrinks to the dimensions of a narrow current along the coast.
