



The Chevsurians, like the old Iberians, the modern Basques and other peoples who preserve traces of a matriarchal order of society, have perpetuated the custom of the father "lying-in" on the birth of a child, as evidence of paternal order of society, have perpetuated the custom of the father "lying-in" on the birth of a child, as evidence of paternal parentage. The women are isolated at pregnancy in special quarters known as the "Satschechi," and cannot return to their own residences until after a ceremonial purification. A Chevsurian father has his trials, too. He must live very abstemiously for seven weeks, while friends and relatives are treated with liquor and beer in abundance. It is believed, or the belief is pretended, that the father's diet reacts on the child's health. The children's names are drawn directly from nature. The boys are named after animals and the girls after sun, moon, stars or flowers.

till four years after the marriage, and that after that there must be three years, at least, between births; and no family ought to have more than three children. Thus the Malthusian law rules these poor people as severely as the "Code Napoleon" rules the French peasants, who fear too great a subdivision of their farms.



FOR FARMERS' WIVES.

A Suggestion as to the Benefits of an Occasional Walk.

While farmers' wives work very hard in summer, it is also true that they take less exercise than any other class In winter they are apt to to to the other extreme and sit in a hot om from morning to night, and when they do go out it is to thrive. A brisk walk is almost an unheard thing, and yet we know no woman can be really strong who does not exercise regularly in open air. When the roads are bad the farmer's wife will stay for weeks in a poorly-ventilated house, and as a onsequence her complexion grows oarse and sallow. It is a question which ages a woman more quickly, the season of hard work over the washtub and stove or the winter spent in an almost comatose condition of eating and sleeping. Even if the roads are impassable for horses and heavy wagons, the farmer's wife should conscientiously take her daily tramp. She can wear rub-ber boots or high-buttoned arctics, and, if well wrapped up, will come nome from her walk warm and rosy, feeling like another being. Some women have asked: "How can we take a walk without an object. There are no shop windows for us to look at, no people to study on the way." But objects can be made. For instance, one lay the farmer's wife can walk to school and come home with the children. They will be delighted, and the little visit to the school and a chat with the teacher will do wonders for the woman who really does not know how the place looks in which her little ones spend most of their time. The interest shown by the mother in the school and teacher will have a gracious reflex influence upon the boys and girls. Neighborhood calls can be made also, and if nothing else presents itself she can go with her husband on his daily inspection of the farm. There is nothing in the world that so binds husband and wife together as the expression of interest in the more personal pursuits of one another. The ordinary man likes to have an interested listener go with him as he walks about his domain, to whom he can point out needed repairs or intended improvements. In this way the wife acquires an influence in the conduct of affairs she would not otherwise gain -Ladies' Home Journal.

Fisheries.


