

Statues of Daniel Webster and General Stark

THE STATUES ARE PLACED IN STATUARY HALL.

Both Houses of Congress Honor the Occasion With Appropriate and Special Exercises.

WITH BEFITTING CEREMONY. WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 .- The veiling that concealed the statues of Daniel Webster and General John Stark, which are placed in the extreme north end of statuary hall in the national Capitol as the gift of the people of New Hampshire, was quietly removed at noon today and the public was for the first time permitted to look upon these latest additions to the national collection of memorial figures.

The senate and house both took appropriate action upon the reception of these works of art but the proceedings were conducted by each body in its own hall. The list of speakers in the senate included the two senators from New Hampshire, Messrs. Chandler and tors Morgan, Morrill, Davis, Cullom, Platt and Mitchell (Ore.) who also spoke of Webster, while Senators Prector and Dubers confined their re-marks to General Stark.

In the house Stark speeches were made by Baker. Powers, Curtis and Biair and for Webster by Messrs. Blair, Everett. Grout and Banker. A MOTH-CATCHING PLANT.

But Holland, on the contrary, of the New Zealand moth-catching plant, "araugia albens." This plant, which is a native of southern Africa, nary maps is sea. This immense tract was introduced to New Zealand quite accidentally about seven years ago, and since then it has been extensively propagated there, on account of its effective service as a killer of destructive Wherever the climate is mild the plant is an exceedingly free grow-er; it twines and climbs with great er; it twines and collins with given luxuriance, and produces immense numbers of white or pinkish flowers, which have a very agreeable scent. These flowers attract innumerable moths. On a summer evening a hedge of araugia will be covered by a perfect cloud of noths, and in the morning there will not be a single flower that does not imprison one or two, and sometimes as many as four insects of various sizes genera. The action of the "araugia" is purely mechanical. The calyx of the flower is rather deep, and the re-ceptacle for its sweet juices is placed at its base. Attracted by the powerful seent and the prospect of honey, the moth dives down the calyx, and protrudes its proboscis to reach the tempting food. But before it can do so the proboscis is nipped between two strong, hard, black pincers, which guard the passage, and once nipped there is no escape for the moth, which is held as in a vise, by the extreme end of the proboscis, and dies miserably. But, at all events, the thing is done effectively, and a plant of araugia covering a space of ten yards in length will destroy as many hundred moths every night, and, consequently, prevent the ravages of fifty times as many larvae. 


