Foster's selection as a representative of China in the peace negotiations has the approval of the Japanese government grew out of a misapprehension. Mr. Kurino views the mission of Mr. Foster as a private affair wholly between him and China and does not think it calls for any expression of approval or disap-proval from himself or his government. This attitude of indifference, he said, had apparently led to the erroneous conclusion that he had officially sanc-tioned the choice of Mr. Foster.
