





Situated at Colima and Now Once More in Active Ecuption The state of Colima lies on the Pa-

cific coast of the republic, due west of the capital, and is only about the size of Connecticut. The ground rises gradually from the coast, frequently intersected by detached, unconnected ranges of the Cordilleras (Sierra Madre), forming between them terrace-like, fertile plains which make Colima one of the richest agricultural states of Mexico. The city of Colima, with 30,-000 inhabitants, at an altitude of 1,450 feet, and 58 miles distant from its port of Manzanillo, is situated almost in the center of one of these plains, which is probably 75 miles in circumference, traversed by several rivers and creeks. Southest and west of it are wooded mountains, from 2,600 to 4,000 feet high, while to the north the ground again at first rises gradually, when above the surrounding country into the limits of eternal snow. From here radiate the almost impassable, deep "barrancas" (canyons) which traverse the state in its northern and northexceedingly difficult.

In August, 1889, the volcano renewed its violence, and remained in eruption for several months. This phenomenon lasted for several days, and was accompanied at intervals by showers of red-hot ashes which descended upon its side. These spasmodic eruptions occurred ten or twelve times a day, and were followed by loud reports similar to the discharge of artillery. At night these sudden eruptions presented the appearance of fireworks on a gigantic scale, which illuminated the country for miles around, and made a grand and awe-inspiring spectacle. THE CAMPHOR LANGUAGE. A Strange Tongue Used by the Natives of

Johore.

One of the strangest languages in the

world, used for the queerest of purposes, is the "camphor language" Johore, a country of the Malay penin sula. It has lately been studied and reported upon by Mr. Lake, an English engineer in the service of the sultan of Johore. This language is called the "Pantang Kapor," or camphor lan-guage, and is used by the natives and all others who are engaged in gathering the product of the Malayan camphor-tree, and only at that time. they used either of the languages of the region, the Malay or the aboriginal Jakun, the natives believe that could not obtain any camphor; and for a most curious reason.

The camphor-tree, Dryobalanops camphora, grows abundantly in certain parts of the peninsula, but occasionally contains camphor crystals. The camphor is not the same as that obtained from the camphor laurel of Formosa and Japan, which is the source of the ordinary camphor of commerce It is of a sort very highly prized by the Chinese in the embalming of their dead, in incense and in medicine, and the gum brings a price much higher than

that of the common camphor.

The Malayans and other Johore natives believe that each species of tree has a spirit, or divinity, that presides over its affairs. The spirit of the camphor-tree is known by the name of Bisan-literally "a woman." Her rest-ing-place is near the trees; and when, at night, a peculiar noise is heard in the woods, resembling that of a cicada, the Bisan is believed to be singing and camphor will surely be found in the

But the spirit of the camphor-trees seems to be jealous of the precious gum, and must be propitiated, and if she knows that hunters are in quest of the propition of the propiti it she will endeavor to turn their steps aside. For from Mr. Lake's account the supposition is probable that the natives think that she is acquainted with both the Malay and Jakun languages, and if the camphor-hunters poke either of those she would know that they had come for camphor, and would defeat their purpose.
