



By far the most important action taken by the board was the passage of a resolution which, if carried out, will radically change the methods of taxa-tion and revenue now in vogue in this and every other county in the upper peninsula. As matters now stand and have stood for many years the county officials col-lect all monies derived from licenses and return the same to the treasurers of the townships and villages without deductions of any sort. The county stands all expenses of collection and is put to all expenses incurred in prosecu-tions of the state excise laws. It is contended by a majority of the county Osceola and Calumet obtain no revenues from saloon licenses, the saloons within the limits of the latter named township being within the village lines of Red Jacket and Calumet Village, so that the township proper gets nothing. These townships pay some three-fourths of the taxes levied in the county, and received no return from the liquor traffic. At the last term of circuit court the county expended over two thousand dollars in the prosecution of liquor cases, and the townships which get not a cent from the liquor sellers must pay over \$1,500 of this cost through direct of the sums collected for liquor licenses, one-half be retained by the county and and-half returned to the township, village or city wherein the money was paid for the licenses.

COMPRESSED WOOD.

A Practical and Inexpensive Substitute for Certain Sorts of Hard Wood. The advance in the price of some of the hard woods required in various special branches of trade has directed attention to the possibility of producing some less expensive material as a substitute, and in one branch of trade this has been carried out with very successful results. For the manufacture of loom shuttles boxwood has hitherto been very largely used, but the price of this kind of wood has become almost prohibitive, and it has been found that compression of cheaper classes of timber-teak being about the most suitable for this purpose-a substitute meeting all the requirements can be obtained. For carrying out this purpose a Manchester firm has just completed a powerful hydraulic press to be used in compressing timber for loom shuttles. This press consists of a strong castiron top and bottom, with four steel columns and a steel cylinder, with a large ram. In the center of this ram is fitted a similar one, with a rectangular head, fitting into a die which is placed on the top of the large ram. The tim-ber is put into this die, and a pressure of fourteen tons per square inch is applied. The pressure is then relieved, and the large ram descends. The top pressure block which fits the die, is then removed, and the small ram, rising, pushes the timber out at the top of the die. The timber so treated is made very dense and uniform, and so closegrained that it is capable of taking a very high finish. For the manufacture of shuttles it has been found as good as boxwood, and there is no doubt it will be applied to other branches of industry where expensive hard woods have to be used.

DETECTING A WEAK EYE.

A Simple Experiment by Which Anyone May Discover the Defect.

They Don't Seem to Mind Flying Far Why an Ordinary Blow Delivered There Away from Their Salt Water Home. Why an Ordinary Blow Delivered There "Why is a blow upon the angle of a man's jaw—the knock-out blow of pugilists—so effective, and what is the immediate result of such a blow?"

Head and a Music Ox Skin "Buffalo skins," said a clerk at the fur store in answer to an inquiry of a New York Sun man, are "practically out of the market. No new ones come in now, and the few that we have on hand are old ones that find their way to the furrier's. The price of a good buffalo skin is from fifty to sixty dollars. They used to be made extensively into fur coats for driving and rough winter traveling, but such a coat is now rarely seen except in the out-of-the-way northern localities, where many old ones are still in use. Raccoon skins have taken the place of buffalo skins in the making of overcoats, but the fur coat is not much used now anywhere except in Minnesota and the British dominions. There is some demand for fur linings, for which mink and Persian lamb are used, and sometimes Hudson bay sable, which costs from four hundred to one thousand dollars for a coat. driving robe has become The gray wolf skins are valueless.

LONG SKATES FOR SPEED. The Philosophy and Hygienics of the Favorite Winter Sport.

Considerable time and ingenuity have been expended recently in the efforts to produce a form of skate which will combine lightness and convenience of arrangement with great speed. The scientific principle involved in this work is far more complex than is generally supposed, and, as outlined by the Scientific American, makes a very in-teresting study. Speed in skating is, of course, attained by the proper applieation of every particle of motive pow-er. When the skater strikes out with

his foot he does not, however, as is generally supposed, obtain momentum from the broad side pressure of the skate on the ice. The momentum is gained by a gradual and tapering pressure which commences at the head of the skate, since it is here that the freshest and strongest force is applied. It will be seen that the momentum is increased, therefore, by the pressure exerted steadily and firmly outward from the heel of the skate to the extreme toe. The proper way to attain great speed is to strike out each foot as close to the other as possible, to continue the stroke up to the toe, and when once the extreme motive power is passed to get the other foot in position as quickly as possible. The prime factors in producing speed, it will be seen, are the full pressure on the ice 2-23-tf and the rapid movement of the legs. Working upon this theory, a long, heavy skate has been manufactured, with a blade which extends several inches beyond the foothold.
