Houghton County Board Takes No Action Concerning the New County Bridge.

BOARD DESIRES CHANGE IN THE STATE LIQUOR LAW.

Wants the Money Collected on Liquor Licenses to Be Used by the County Which Collects It.

The regular monthly session of the county board was held at the court house Tuesday morning, half a day being sufficient to get through all the work on hand. The usual batch of bills were allowed, though a few persons holding accounts against the county were disappointed through getting in their bills too late.

The plans and specifications for the new bridge not having reached here, though expected daily, nothing was done relative to that business. The special committee of five, of which Captain Duncan is chairman, has full power to let contracts if desired and it will not be necessary to await a meeting of the full board to get the new bridge under way if found preferable to let the contracts as soon as possible.

As matters now stand and have stood for many years the county officials collect all monies derived from licenses and return the same to the treasurers of the townships and villages without deductions of any sort. The county stands all expenses of collection and is put to all expenses incurred in prosecutions of the state excise laws.

A bill carrying out the spirit of the resolution will be drafted and presented at an early date. Feb. 19 is the latest date on which bills can be introduced, so no time will be lost in getting the measure before the house, and it is probable that it will pass.

HISTORY OF ALMANACS.

They Had Their Origin Before the Coming of Christ. The history of written almanacs dates back to the second century of the Christian era. The Alexandrian Greeks in the time of Ptolemy, A. D. 100-160, used almanacs. Prior to the written almanacs of the Greeks there were calendars of primitive almanacs.

About 300 B. C. one Censorius Flavius, the secretary of Appius Claudius, learned the secret, either by the stealthy use of the documents in his master's possession, or, according to Pliny, by repeatedly consulting the authorities and by collating the information obtained. It was really publishing an almanac when, as Livy relates, he exhibited the fasti on white tablets round the forum.

Whether the word "almanac" be from al and manah, to count, or al and manah, is not agreed; some authorities give it a Teutonic etymology, from the words al and manah, the moon. Each of the conjectures is plausible. Tables representing almanacs were used by the Arabs at an early date, mainly as astronomical guides, and it is highly probable that both the thing and the name originated with them.

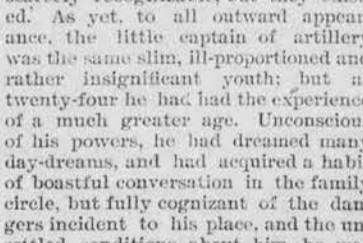

COMPRESSED WOOD.

A Practical and Inexpensive Substitute for Certain Sorts of Hard Wood.

The advance in the price of some of the hard woods required in various special branches of trade has directed attention to the possibility of producing some less expensive material as a substitute, and in one branch of trade this has been carried out with very successful results. For the manufacture of loom shuttles boxwood has hitherto been very largely used, but the price of this kind of wood has become almost prohibitive, and it has been found that by compression of cheaper classes of timber—teak being about the most suitable for this purpose—a substitute meeting all the requirements can be obtained.

DETECTING A WEAK EYE.

A Simple Experiment by Which Anyone May Discover the Defect.

"Yes," said the doctor, to a writer for the Jewelers' Review, "the makers of optical instruments are turning out some wonderful appliances nowadays for discovering imperfections of vision, but I'll tell you of a plan for testing the respective strength of your eyes that is as simple as it is trustworthy. All you need is a stereoscope and a photograph. That arrangement in which the picture holder slides up and down a flat frame, in trombone fashion, is the best sort of stereoscope for the purpose, although any will do, and the photograph that will give the best results is a cabinet size view of some locality with people in it. The modus operandi is simplicity itself. Put the photograph in the holder and focus it just enough so that you can see the faces clearly. Then close the left eye and look at the picture intently with your right eye while you count thirty slowly. Now close the right eye and look at the picture with your left eye for the same length of time. Then open both eyes and look at the picture without changing the focus. Something queer will happen. The figures on the one side of the picture will seem to move across the view and group themselves with those on the other side, and this is the point of the experiment—the figures will always move away from the weak eye. Moreover, they move with a very precise relation of speed to the weakness of vision. If the left eye, for example, is quite weak, the figures will move very quickly across the plane of sight to the right side, while if there is but a slight defect the movement will be gradual, and so on. A queer thing about this experiment is that, simple as it seems, it will bring out defects of vision that have never been suspected, and another queer thing is that it will demonstrate the cases in which both eyes are of equal power to be surprisingly exceptional. I have tried it in a score of mixed gatherings, and never yet without having the experimenter observe some movement of the figures. There was one old lady, I remember, up at Port Jefferson last summer, who persisted in saying that she saw precisely with both eyes as she did with one eye, and well she might, for when I examined her eyes more closely I found she was stone blind on the left side and didn't know it."
