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

A GRACIFUL BEARING. Requirements of a Correct Figure and How to Gain It

The first secret of successful dressing is a graceful carriage and a well-shaped form which must not be too plump or too slim.

Of course beauty of form varies in different women, while we do not all admire the same type of beauty. Indeed, if every one admired the same type of beauty, it would go very hard with some of us. Undoubtedly a handsome form is much to be admired; in-deed, it may be questioned if a perfect form does not possess a power of cap-tivating beyond any charms that the most beautiful face possesses.

The natural figure does not take the curves of the hourglass, and a small, pinched-in waist does not mean beauty of form. Far from it, for it is most detrimental to beauty, for it destroys health.

A perfectly formed woman will stand from 5 feet 5 inches to 5 feet 7 inches, and weigh from 125 to 140 pounds. Her shoulders and hips will strike a straight line, drawn up and down, and her waist will taper in gradually and measure 24 to 26 inches, and her bust 19 inches larger-that is 36 to 38 inches.

The bust can be enlarged easily and safely, and those whose forms are too slight should certainly give attention to this most important point. Nondevelopment can be overcome with patience and proper treatment, for nature will not be hurried. Such exercise as throwing the shoulders well back, then drawing in a long, deep breath, holding it by effort for a few seconds, then gradually letting go, is splendid exercise. This should be repeated 20 or 30 times, morning and night, for it expands and strengthens

RATTLESNAKES' PARADISE. Southern Arizona Is the Reptile's

Favorite Breeding Ground. Experiences of "Rattler Jim" Davis, the Most Celebrated Snake Killer of the Southwest-Efficacy of Whisky

as an Antidote.

There is no locality in the union, o Prof. Henry Palmer, of the Smithsonian institution says, that is so nat-ural a breeding-ground for the ratilemake - the Crotalus horridus uthern Arizona. Similar authority is quoted to the effect that there i scarcely a more venomous reptile in the country than the bloated rattler of this region. The rocks of the mountains and foothills are a heavy yellow and gray color, and the soil is so nearly the hues of a rattler that a snake can move slowly along and be hardly perceived by a person fifty feet The hot, dry air, and the warm. away. sandy earth, through at least ten months in the year, and the immense quantity of small birds and ground squirrels in the mountain canyons and brush, all combine to make life for rattlesmakes in this region one of rare

se and comfort for many a long year. There are literally tens of thousands of rattlers in the sage brush and chaparral along the edge of the southern Arizona wastes. They grow to enormous size, and it is common to read in the local newspapers of this part of the territory items of news of the capture of rattlesnakes five and six feet ig and with fourteen and fifteen rattles. Localities and objects of nature all over the territory have been named from the serpents. There are rattlesnake canyons, rattlesnake arroyos, rattlesnake creeks, rattlesnake mountains and rattlesnake gulches. Over at Maricopa an old fellow has named his dispensary of intoxicants after the most venomous American nakes, and "Rattlesnake Roost,"

painted in clumsy letters, stands in bold relief over the door. The best informed man in regard to rattlers in this part of the territory is acknowedged to be Jim Davis. He is about sixty-five years old, and has lived on the border of civilization for fifty years. He is one of the large army of men who were eternally demoralized by the gold booms in Cali-fornia years ago, and became relegated to a devil-may-care, independent and happy-go-lucky way of getting his liv-ing by using his gun and by traveling across the mountains and over the val-

tipped back in a chair, sucking a vile corncob pipe, in a saloon in Benson, A. T., the other day. "You bet yer life I know a thing or two about I've killed thousands of 'em. I've been here in this snake country just close onto twenty-four years, and never have been out of it. I could sit all night and keep telling you something new every minute about rattlesnakes. Gosh! how I hate the varmints. I never miss trying to kill 'em off, but it's about useless tryin' to clear out this yere country of rattlers. They left Duluth Feb. 11, and arrived in New York Feb. 17, just six days in transit and the quickest freight time for the tlesnakes a year, so I've about given up tryin' to do anything more at snake killin'

> bugs are all over the country, and they buzz just like the rattlers. Whenever I'm out hunting and kick a bush a whole swarm of locusts, buzzin' for all they're worth, come flying out. Their singin' puts me off my guard, because I can't hear the rattlesnakes a rattlin'. I'm most afraid to hunt at all now, for you know it's just about certain sure death for an old white man like me to get Arizona rattlesnake venom in his body at the end of a long summer. I'd rather be shot plumb through the chest any day than to take chances on pullin' through a pizenin' by a desert rattler, when he is puffed up plumb full of pizen as they are now. At some seasons of the year there ain't any where near as much danger from rat-

"But Arizona rattlesnakes ain't near so dangerous in some ways as them new opera, and am hastening down to used to be back in the mountains of the De Fashion theater to have the Pennsylvania and Ohio. The desert used to be back in the mountains of rattlers are fat and lazy. They ain't got no fight in 'em. They ain't got no real meanness in 'em. ### RESTORING FEATHERS.

Hints for Dyeing Also Will Prove of Service to Many Women.

A new and satisfactory way to clean white hat feathers is to dip them in

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lime water. Make the solution quite thick and allow the plumes to remain in the wash for some time.

When thoroughly soaked lift them gently out of the bath so the mixture will partially adhere. Next lay the feathers on a rough cloth, letting them remain until dry.

Then shake thoroughly and softly beat against the cloth until all the par ticles of dry lime have fallen off. sun bath of a few minutes will restore their freshness, and the usual amateur process of holding them over steam to regain the curl will result in their being almost as good as new.

In curling feathers with steel, it should be remembered that only the blunt side of the instrument should be

A wise receipt to follow in preparing feathers for beds is this: Water is sat urated with quicklime; the feathers are well steeped and stirred for three or four days; they are taken out, drained and washed in clean water, dried on nets or dry cloth, shaken occasionall while drying and finally beaten to expel any dust. This is for amateur treatment; the most efficient method is to have them steamed by machines. To dye white or cream feathers, it will be found that they take easily to

all dyeing materials. Safflower and lemon juice for rose color or pink, Brazil wood for deep red, Brazil wood and cudbear for erimson, indigo for blue and weld for



TELLING TIME IN THE DARK. It Needs a Little Calculation and Regular "What time is it?"

"I think I can tell you without look-

He drew out his watch and held it. up close to his ear and slowly turned the stem winder. "One, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight," he count-"That means seventy-two minutes. I wound the watch up tightly at 3 o'clock, and so the time ought to be about twelve minutes past 4. Let's see how near I came to it. Well, it's 4:18-I was only six minutes off."

The other was regarding him with amazement. "Do you mean to say that you can tell the time of day by

winding up your watch?" Not exactly, but I can come mighty near it; usually within ten minutes, and it's very simple, too. All you have to know is how long one tick in winding up will run the watch. I'll explain to you. Suppose that at 3 o'clock I wind up my watch until it is tight. as we say; that is, until another turn of the winder would apparently break the spring. At 5 o'clock I wind the watch again, and find that the winder clicks twelve times before the watch is wound up to the place where it sticks. Then you know that twelve ticks will run the watch 120 minutes and that one click represents ten minutes of time."

"What good is it to know that?" "Well, suppose you go to bed at 11 o'clock to-night, and on retiring wind up your watch and put it under your pillow. During the night you wake up and wonder what time it is. You don't want to get up and light the gas. All you have to do is to pull that watch out from under the pillow, hold it to your ear and count the ticks as you wind. If you count 18 then you know that the watch has run down 180 minutes since 11 o'clock, and that the time must be very near 2 o'clock. be sure, you can't tell the exact time, but you can generally get within a quarter of an hour of it."

"I dare say it would, but I neve tried it on anything except a stemwinding watch.
