

HOT SPRINGS DEPOPULATED

An Epidemic of Small-Pox is Driving Many People from That Resort.

RUMORED THAT SEVENTY-FIVE CASES ARE REPORTED.

The Place Has Been Quarantined by Surrounding Towns and Inhabitants Are Panic Stricken.

THE ENTIRE CITY IS EXPOSED. ST. LOUIS, Feb. 27.—On the train from the south today were fully three hundred badly scared passengers from Hot Springs, Ark., who left that popular resort in a hurry yesterday to escape the small-pox.

The authorities at Malvern compelled the trainmen to lock all the passengers from the Springs in the cars while the trains were passing through that town.

"People are pouring out of Hot Springs panic stricken. Every available seat was taken in the train yesterday and a great many more would have left could they have got away."

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 17.—Dr. Jennings, secretary of the state board of health, investigated the small-pox situation at Hot Springs and reports thirty-two cases there.

AGREED ON NO SITE.

House Quarrelled Over Location of New Government Printing Office

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—The conference report on the pension appropriation bill reporting that an agreement had been reached was presented in the house and agreed to. The conference report on the bill for a pension for General Harrison C. Hobart was agreed to after which the house proceeded to the consideration of bills reported from the public buildings committee.

CONVENTION ENDED.

Retail Lumber Dealers of Illinois Conclude Business.

CHICAGO, Feb. 27.—At the meeting of Illinois lumbermen today the insurance feature was passed upon and the proposition of the Retail Lumbermen's Insurance company to accept insurance of the members of the association and no others in the state was accepted.

DENY THE INSURRECTION.

Spanish Minister Says There Is No Revolt in Cuba.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Minister Murruaga of Spain tonight said he had received a dispatch from Key West, Fla., announcing that a party of filibusters had organized there and were about to start for Cuba to stir up revolution in the island.

MADRID, Feb. 27.—A dispatch from Havana announces that in skirmishes with government troops in Matanzas the rebels lost two killed and three taken prisoners.

DEEP WATERWAY BILL.

Has Been Introduced in the Senate by Senator Allison.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Allison introduced in the senate a bill similar to the one presented in the house providing for the construction of a navigable canal through the territory of the United States from the great lakes and St. Lawrence river and the great lakes and tide water in the Hudson river to be built by the Maritime Canal company of North America.

Falls, S. D., was again raised in executive session of the senate today but Pettigrew objected to the submission of this matter in the absence of a quorum and the nomination again went over.

AFTER THE ACCOMPLICES.

Several Persons Charged With Robbing South Dakota Are Indicted. PIERRE, Feb. 27.—Justice Yarnell today issued warrants for the arrest of W. W. Taylor, the treasurer of South Dakota; Charles T. McCoy of Aberdeen; John T. McChesney, New York; D. K. Tenney, Chicago; Charles N. Wells, Chicago, on complaint of Attorney General Crawford, charging them with conspiracy to rob South Dakota out of \$360,000 in January last.

FIRE CAUSES A PANIC.

Several Girls Are Severely Injured During a Chicago Fire.

CHICAGO, Feb. 27.—During a disastrous fire in the heart of the west side factory district this morning the Charles Kaestner & Co.'s five story building was entirely destroyed, as was also a section of the Crane Manufacturing company's plant.

HUDD WAS NOT ENGAGED.

He Will Not Commence Suit for the Streater Property.

CHICAGO, Feb. 27.—Miss Annie Moody of this city, who says she lately discovered while searching through some old legal papers that she had a government patent to some ten million dollars worth of real estate in the heart of Streater, Ill., was shown the telegram from Green Bay, Wis., today saying that she had retained ex-Congressman Thomas R. Hudd to bring suit against ex-Congressman Plumb of Illinois for land valued at \$2,000,000.

More Indictments Expected.

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 27.—The arrests of persons indicted for election frauds are being made slowly. Twelve, however, voluntarily surrendered themselves. The grand jury has not yet concluded its investigation and it is believed further indictments will be returned.

Want Malloy Retained.

ST. JOHNS, N. Y., Feb. 27.—A memorial has been signed by the leading citizens requesting the United States senate to reconsider the appointment of Ryan of Wisconsin as consul to New Foundland in place of Malloy, who has held the consularship for twenty-five years.

BASEBALL LEAGUE MEETS.

Clubs Comprising National League Hold Annual Meeting in New York.

ARE MAKING MANY CHANGES IN THE RULES.

The National Board Listens to Officers' Reports and Elects Officers for the ensuing year.

PREPARING FOR THE SEASON.

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—The various baseball clubs making up the National league held an annual meeting at the Fifth Avenue Hotel today. At 6:30 this evening after the delegates had been in session over six hours Secretary Young gave out an account of the meeting which was held behind closed doors.

At the meeting of the National board, composed of Young, Soden and Byrne, the treasurer's report was adopted and N. E. Young re-elected secretary and treasurer. The changes suggested by the rules committee was the first business taken up when the league was called to order.

They forced the porter to uncouple the train from the engine, baggage and express cars. After going half a mile they compelled the express messenger to open the door of the safe and tear open the packages.

RUIN SEEMS INEVITABLE.

Cuban Sugar Planters Are Threatened With Bankruptcy.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Without some concessions or advance in the price of sugar another year will see a state of affairs dreadful and disastrous even with the most prosperous Cuban planters. This is the substance of the report to the department of state by Walter B. Basker, United States consul at Sagua La Grande, Cuba, upon the subject of the financial embarrassments of sugar planters.

"LOST MINE" REVIVED.

Farmer Thinks He Has Found Silver Mine in Illinois.

PERCY, Feb. 27.—The story of the "Lost Mine" has been revived by the discovery made by George Boxdorfer. He found a large flat rock near Allens Landing road, close to the old McCauley mill, which covered a large cave.

LEAVING WEI-HAI-WEI.

The Japanese Army is Abandoning Its Last Conquest.

CHI FOO, China, Feb. 26.—The Japanese are evacuating their advanced positions at Wei-Hai-Wei. Ning Hai, a town lying about midway between Wei-Hai-Wei and this city, has been abandoned. The greater part of the Japanese army has embarked upon transports which have left Wei-Hai-Wei for Talienwan on Liu Tung Peninsula.

Government Buildings Burned.

HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 27.—All the Dominion government immigration sheds, wharf, offices and other buildings were burned today. Several firemen were injured. The government loss is \$600,000; other losses, \$100,000.

Forecast of the Weather.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—9 p. m.—The weather bureau reports the following as the forecast for the next twenty-four hours. For upper Michigan: Rain in early morning followed by fair, southwest winds.

La Libertad Is Safe.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 27.—The Mexican man-of-war La Libertad, which it was feared had foundered during some storm on the gulf, arrived out of coal and with sails split.

Flouring Mill Burned.

PEABODY, Kan., Feb. 27.—The flouring mill of Wilson Bros burned today. The loss is \$100,000.

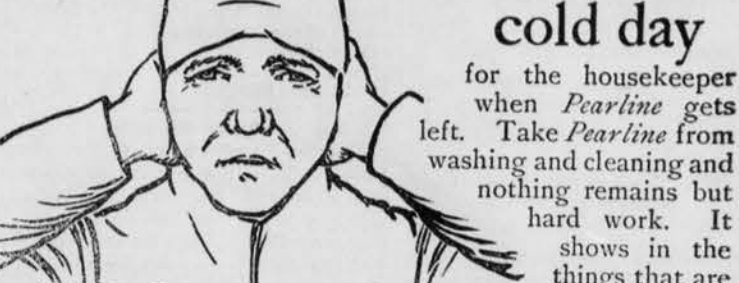
