interference with this country and its interests, which have become their own. Such citizens make as good Americans as we whose ancestors for generations have been born here. But the controlling personnel of this paper, if naturalized at all, are so only in the letter. They prefer the other side of the Atlantic, and teach deference to Europe-especially to England-and foreign example, as their es

By the course of their paper they at all times invite encroachment upon American interests.

My speech was an entirely accurate statement of historic facts, and an exact presentation of our environment and of existing conditions. These have not been criticized; but my appeal for a still further increase of the navy, for a larger regular army (not a large army, as they quote me) and for adequate coast defenses, is what is stigmatized as jingoism by their people,

I notice that it has also aroused to indignant deprecation, and some sarcasm, a distinguished, versatile, and very erudite statesman of the east.

Well, there is nothing new about it. It has been iterated and reiterated, even in carefully prepared state papers, from the time of the first president down to the last, both inclusive. I write in my library, and I here take





These difficulties were overcome by These difficulties were overcome by using quartz instead of glass, with which it was possible to obtain a very pure spectrum sufficiently rich in blue and violet rays to kill the spores in a few hours. The author found it easy to obtain satisfactory results in the summer with solar rays, even with glass lenses, mirrors, etc., and exposures of five or six hours, but in winter the exposures required to be so long as to be almost impracticable.
