DESPITE their preliminary bluster, the A. P. A. gang at Omaha backed down when it came to a point where they had to back their sounding words with blows, and the supreme court of Nebraska will now adjudicate between the contending police forces of that city.

MANUFACTURERS of print paper have formed a trust for the purpose of doing away with competition and keeping up prices. This has led to a counter movement on the part of the publishers who consume the product of the paper mills, and they propose to go into the business of manufacturing their own paper if the trust undertakes to deal with them oppressively.

THE miners' strike in this county is now nearing the close of its fifth week, and the men and the mining companies seem to be as far apart as ever. The loss to the men in wages unearned is a very heavy tax on them, as well as on business of the county generally, and the companies are undoubtedly losers to some extent by the stoppage of shipments.

FLOWER of the Superior Leader is trying desperately to make a national issue of himself since Governor Upham of Wisconsin appointed another man to fill the office of deep waterways commissioner, which Flower induced a fool legislature to create in the expectation that he would be chosen to fill the office and draw the salary attached to it.

AN effort is being made by Receiver Kelly of the West Superior Iron & Steel company and Superintendent Robertson of the same company to arrange for leasing the West Duluth blast furnace for a year with a view to putting it in operation. The furnace has now been idle about two years.

It is probable that if arrangements are made to put the furnace again in blast the faults which made so much trouble when it was in operation before will be remedied.

There are heavy withdrawals of gold for export, and the syndicate of bankers which is under contract to "protect" the reserve until the first of October is making good these withdrawals by exchanging gold for legal tender notes.
