

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



IRISH ISSUES IGNORED.

Amendments to Reply to Queen's Speech Downed in Commons. Conference Recommends Establishment

LONDON, Aug. 16.-In commons today Thomas Lough, Liberal, resumed the amendment to the address in reply to the queen's speech, declaring the ne-cessity of immediate legislation on the land question in accordance with the recommendations of last year's com-mittee. The English courts are making com-plaint of the decline of litigation. 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




