

A PINGREE CLUB ORGANIZED

Admirers of the Detroit Mayor Take Steps to Secure His Nomination for Governor.

ACTIVE PREPARATION TO CARRY REPUBLICAN CAUCUSES.

Postmaster Midlam Secures a Better Mail Service to the Twin Cities—Application of John King for a Parole Not Yet Made.

A STRONG REPUBLICAN CLUB.

A large crowd of citizens, all interested in the nomination of Hazen S. Pingree for governor, on the Republican ticket, assembled at the city hall last night to organize for the campaign.

The undersigned, residents and voters of Marquette, in the county of Marquette, Michigan, do hereby declare as follows: Whereas, Hazen S. Pingree has served the people of the city of Detroit as mayor for three successive terms, and has been re-elected for a fourth term, and has been victorious in many hard fights with great, powerful and unscrupulous corporations, resulting in many benefits to the people, and has resisted every temptation from the path of honesty and duty, and has proved himself to be courageous, tireless and conscientious in the discharge of his duties, and at all times on the side of the people, their loyal friend and defender, and has produced great good by his reform methods, ideas and acts; and

Whereas, The policy and actions of many such corporations are against the public welfare, and antagonistic to the real interests of the stock-holders thereof, as well as to good government, and subversive of the great principle of "Equal rights to all and special privileges to none," and who have in their employ thousands of persons; and

Whereas, Hazen S. Pingree has, by compelling the millionaire to pay taxes on the same basis as the owner of the cottage and farm, and causing a reduction of the rates and charges of such corporations, and in other ways shown the spirit of the true American, and the brave, fearless and successful friend of all classes of citizens, and will, if nominated and elected, use every means in his power to adjust the burdens of direct and indirect taxation and state government, and the charges and rates of transportation and other corporations, so as to be fair and just to all persons and interests, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, the undersigned, do hereby agree and pledge ourselves to support the candidacy of Hazen S. Pingree for governor of Michigan, by selection and putting upon our caucus tickets for delegates to the convention to nominate a Republican candidate for governor, only such men as are reliable, and will work and vote for the nomination of Hazen S. Pingree, and we further pledge ourselves to attend the caucuses, and urge our friends and neighbors to do the same, believing that the results of the caucuses will practically decide who is to be our next governor; and

Resolved, That we now proceed to organize for the purpose of putting into effect the declarations above under the name of The Marquette Pingree Gubernatorial club, with the usual officers and standing committees, and that a committee be appointed to draft the necessary by-laws and rules for the club, to that all who desire Mr. Pingree for governor, be entitled to membership; and further

Resolved, That as the governor of this state has no voice or power, as such, in the regulation of the tariff, currency or any other national question, no discussion shall take place in this club upon any subject which does not pertain to state affairs and government.

After the reading of the resolutions, a committee, consisting of John Riordan, F. H. Vandenberg, C. H. Kelsey, A. F. Agnew and Fred Archembeau, was appointed to nominate permanent officers, a recess was taken to allow the committee to act and in the meantime those, who had not previously done so, went forward to sign the membership roll. About ten full sheets, containing the names of many of the best known Republicans in the city, were filled, the list containing 215 signatures by actual count. By the time all had signed this Pingree pledge, the committee on officers had completed its deliberations and reported, recommending the election of the following gentlemen: George Arthur Brown, president; Jules Bertrand, vice president; C. H. Kelsey, secretary and treasurer. The report was adopted with a whoop.

It was next decided to appoint a committee on membership, to canvass the city and enroll the whole Pingree strength, so as to make it certain that when the time comes there shall not be one delegate in the city convention opposed to the reform candidate. The fact that "eternal vigilance is the price of liberty" was particularly dwelt upon, the object being to impress upon the club members that they must attend the caucuses where the battle will be fought. This committee will be announced later. After the appointment of a committee on by-laws, and another to secure a place for future meetings, the club adjourned subject to call.

The officers of the club are confident that within a short time a large majority of the Republican voters of Marquette will be enrolled as members and they feel equally certain that the effect of the organization will be the election of Pingree delegates from this county to the state convention. "I have discovered no opposition sentiment here," said President Brown, "and if it does exist, it is too weak to assert itself." The club contains no office-seekers, no one who expects a job if the mayor of Detroit becomes governor of Michigan, but all sincerely wish that result because they believe it to be for the best interests of the commonwealth.

Improved Mail Service. Postmaster Midlam has succeeded in getting a better mail service between Marquette and St. Paul and Minneapolis, something he has been striving for several weeks. Under the new arrangement mail, deposited in the Marquette postoffice as late as 5 p. m., will reach the Twin Cities at 9 the next

morning, whereas until now it has been necessary to have the mail leave here at 3 o'clock p. m. The new rule, which will no doubt be of considerable benefit to business men and commercial travelers, will go into effect today.

King Not Yet Paroled. The following dispatch from Negaunee in reference to a convict in the local penitentiary has been given considerable publicity in Milwaukee and other city papers:

John King, the champion wrestler, now serving a term of five years in the branch prison at Marquette for complicity in the express robbery of some \$50,000 in money from a train on the Mineral Range railroad, near Hancock, about three years ago, is about to be paroled by Governor Rich. The date of his release has been set for May 18. Work in his behalf by friends throughout the upper peninsula and good behavior of the prisoner since his confinement have favored him considerably.

Being informed of this dispatch yesterday, Warden Van Evers said: "The statements therein are untrue. Governor Rich has not decided to parole King, nor has such a course been recommended by the prison officials. May 18 will be two years and a half since the date of his sentence and then he will be eligible to apply for a parole. When the application is made it must be passed upon and approved by the prison authorities before being sent to the governor, who then acts as he sees fit. There is no certainty that King will be paroled."

Meeting of Three Leagues. Seventy-five Epworth Leaguers from Negaunee and fifty-one from Ishpeming spent a few hours last evening at the Methodist church as the guests of the local League. He will be given a reasonable length of time to get here and make his estimates as the commission has plenty of time and is in no hurry.

Ice cutting, which has been impossible the greater part of the winter season on account of the mildness of the weather, is now going on rapidly, there being considerable ice in the harbor. Three houses have been filled and the fourth, Johnson's, soon will be.
