Among the many industries to which the copper country may lay claim at the present time, aside from mines and mining, there are none more potent in their possibilities than the brewing interests, which today have grown from small beginnings to interests which bid fair to build up for Houghton county a reputation in the malt line which at some period not far distant shall extend even beyond the limits of the Wolverine state.

Among the several worthy institutions of this nature located in Houghton county there is one which at this time is deserving of special mention. This is the Haas Brewing establishment, located at Houghton, under the efficient management of Christof Fox. As far back as 1859 this institution had its foundation by Adam Haas, one of the early pioneers of the copper country, and since deceased. From a modest affair, erected merely to supply the wants of the immediate locality, it rapidly grew larger, until in 1887 the company was formally incorporated.

In company with Mr. Christof Fox the late Mr. Haas made a trip through the institution and it was a trip which would be fraught with interest every step of the way to one not familiar with the curious and interesting process by which the fragrant barley malt is changed into the cool, foaming lager. The most noticeable improvement in the entire plant is the new ammonia cooling apparatus—nothing finer exists in any brewery in the state.

Under the management of the Haas brewery possessed twenty storage vats, each holding from ten to forty barrels. Now it has only thirteen new vats, but each one of these holds 120 barrels. They are made from the finest redwood grown in California.

ONE OF THE RAIDERS.

Capt. Heaney, of Dr. Jameson's Staff, Returns to America.

Refuses to Talk Concerning His Part in Attack on Boers—President Kruger May Ask His Return on Charge of Treason.

Capt. Maurice Heaney, the American who was a member of Dr. Jameson's staff and participated in the latter's inglorious raid on the Boers in South Africa in December last, has just arrived in New York city from England.

Capt. Heaney took a very active part in Jameson's raid and is said to have been closer to "Dr. Jim" than any other man concerned in the military expedition.

It is believed that President Kruger, of the South Africa republic, will demand the captain's return on a charge of treason, but the request is not likely to be granted.

CRITICAL EDITION OF BIBLE.

One-Half is in Type and Portions Will Appear Soon.

Prof. Paul Haupt, of the Johns Hopkins university, editor in chief of the new critical edition of the Hebrew Bible, states that one-half of the edition is in type and that several parts, including Genesis, the Psalms, Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, Ezekiel and Daniel will appear, it is expected, in 1897.

The new English translation is also well under way. Four parts are in type, and three of these will appear about April. They are, like the Hebrew text, printed on colored backgrounds to show the approximate dates of the origins of the various portions, emendations, interpolations, etc.

HUBERT KEMP A PRODIGY. Not Seven Years Old He Sets Type in His Father's Office at Frankton, Ind. Hubert H. Kemp, son of E. A. Kemp, editor and publisher of the Frankton (Ind.) Leader, asserts the distinction of being the youngest all-round printer in the state, if not in all America.

Hubert is now 6 1/2 years old, and is quite small for his age, weighing only 35 pounds. Every day he can be seen at the "case" sitting on a large dictionary on a compositor's stool, a midge among the printing fraternity, with a handful of type to distribute, or a "stick" and "rule" to "set" type.

His inclination to learn the printer's trade began in 1894, when he was less than five years old, and the first practical work he did was to "feed papers" to a press, and in a few weeks he was able to "feed" the country Campbell at a speed of 800 an hour.

From this achievement he naturally turned to others, and many hours were spent at the "case," where he learned his alphabet, and begged to set type, but was denied the pleasure until a few months ago. He cannot spell a word of more than a few letters, yet he now takes "reprint" and sets at the rate of a galley of 22 inches long primer in a day. He is also accurate and quite speedy in distributing, and can throw in type at more than half the average speed.

ACROSS THE PACIFIC. The American Schooner Aida Made It in the Quickest Time. According to reports received by the hydrographic office, the American schooner Aida, commanded by Capt. A. Anderson, has made the quickest passage across the Pacific ever made by a sailing vessel. She made the run from Shanghai to Port Townsend in 26 days, breaking the record. Few sailing vessels have crossed the Atlantic ocean, about half the distance covered by the Aida, in the same length of time.

In and About Negaunee.

CHARGED WITH BURGLARY.

Four Men Under Arrest on Complaint of John Truan.

William Richards, William Sharp, Thomas Richards and Patrick Gallon, four Negaunee men, were arrested Thursday evening on the charge of burglary. The complaints were made by John Truan before Cornelius Kennedy, a justice of the peace at Ishpeming. Gallon was arrested in Ishpeming, where he has been working for the Lake Superior Iron company for some time past. A short time after William Richards was placed under arrest here. William Sharp and Thomas Richards heard that there was a warrant out for their arrest, so they voluntarily went to the officer who held it and gave themselves up.

It is alleged that the four men mentioned called at Truan's house on the night of Feb. 8. They previously purchased a bottle of whiskey and they treated Truan so freely with the liquor that he became intoxicated. They then broke open Truan's trunk, it is charged, and stole \$200, a magnifying glass, worth \$3, and a package of 'Peers' tobacco valued at five cents. Officer Marketvey was in an adjoining room, he hearing the noise and dropped in to see what was going on. The officer did not know the robbery had been committed, however, until advised of it some time later by Truan. Nothing was said regarding the matter as Truan and the officer were in hopes of obtaining positive proof against the suspects. What the result of their investigation has been THE MINING JOURNAL could not learn yesterday, but it is not likely that the arrests were made wholly on suspicion.

It is asserted that among the money stolen there was a \$100 bank note. This, it is claimed, Gallon recently presented in payment for a drink at an Ishpeming saloon. The proprietor could not cash the bill, so it was returned to Gallon. "The prisoners were all taken to Ishpeming for a hearing yesterday. E. J. Carey of this city has been engaged to defend them. They pleaded not guilty to the charge. Owing to the absence from the county of prosecuting attorney H. O. Young their examination was postponed until next Thursday morning at 9 o'clock. Mr. Carey protested strongly against postponing the examination as he thought the prisoners should not be kept in jail so long. The bonds of the defendants were placed at \$500 each. Mr. Carey also protested against this, as he thought the amount was altogether too large. His protest was of no avail, so the prisoners were escorted to the Ishpeming jail where they will await the examination, unless in the meantime they furnish the necessary security for their appearance.

Patrick Gallon is forty years of age, William Richards twenty-three, William Sharp seventeen and Thomas Richards eighteen.

MAY OPERATE THE LUCY.

Sam Hoar Thinks of Working it Under Lease.

Samuel Hoar, who returned a few days ago from a visit to Englad, is thinking somewhat of leasing the Lucy mining property and putting the mine in operation. He says he can secure a favorable lease of the mine and has been assured of financial assistance. Mr. Hoar procured samples of ore from the property this week and will have them assayed without delay. Operations can be resumed at the Lucy without a very great outlay, as the underground portion of the mine is in very fair condition and the machinery is also in good order. If the result of the assays, what Mr. Hoar expects will be in all probability take hold of the mine.

Couldn't Stay Away.

Ben Weber has returned from the copper country and intends to remain here permanently. Ben had no difficulty getting a position in copperdom, but he had lived at Negaunee so long that he couldn't content himself away from here. He will take his old place with Wollner & Elliott within the next few days.

CARRIERS WIN THEIR CASE.

Some of Uncle Sam's Local Employees to be Paid for Their Overtime Service.

ABOUT EIGHT HUNDRED DOLLARS FOR THE CARRIERS.

Preparations Now Actively on Foot for Reception of Governor-to-be Pingree Next Week—Two More Old Settlers Dead.

CASE UNDER EIGHT HOUR LAW.

Carrier Frank Westworth has received word that judgment in favor of the letter carriers of Marquette for their overtime service, on the claims sent to William Fletcher & Co., attorneys and solicitors of government claims at Washington, D. C., has been granted by the United States court of appeals. The whole amount of the judgment is \$776.96. All but one of the local carriers are interested, also three others who are now ex-carriers—J. P. Dube of Grand Forks, N. D., Josiah Wiles of Duluth, Minn., and August Thoney of this city.

The case grew out of an act of congress enacted May 24, 1888, making eight hours a day's work. Previous to that time many of the carriers had worked nine, ten and eleven hours a day which they justly considered an imposition. But, even under the new law the state of affairs was not bettered and long hours remained the rule until the Buffalo, N. Y., carriers effected a coup d'etat by suing the national government for overtime. They secured a verdict in the United States district court, and, on appeal, won again. The precedent having been established and the right of the carriers to collect pay for their full time on duty thus having been recognized by the federal courts, similar suits were instituted in all parts of the country, at Marquette among other places. The claim of the local carriers was filed about two years ago.

In 1894 the postoffice department ordered that no carriers be allowed to work more than eight hours a day, whether all the mail was delivered or not, and this rule which is still in force prevents any further overtime.

Scripts' Course Denounced.
A meeting of the executive committee of the Pingree Republican club of Marquette was held last evening and arrangements were made to give Detroit's famous mayor a rousing reception on the occasion of his visit here April 4. The Casino has been engaged for the demonstration in his honor and in addition to the speech from Mayor Pingree an address by Rev. Morgan Wood of Detroit and short speeches by local speakers will form a part of the evening's program.

A resolution was passed inviting the members of Albert Jackson post, No. 300, G. A. R., to be present to meet their old comrade in arms, a reception committee consisting of the officers of the club, F. O. Clark, H. F. Handford and other citizens, was appointed and other committees also arranged for. In view of the malicious persecutions of Mayor Pingree by the Scripps newspapers of Detroit since James E. Scripps was kicked off the park board by the mayor the following was adopted:

Resolved, That the Pingree Republican club of Marquette regards the policy of the Evening News and Tribune of Detroit toward Mayor Pingree, the most prominent Republican gubernatorial candidate in the state today, as utterly unjust and willfully malicious.

Resolved, That this club deplores the lack of true Republicanism in a paper which makes such pretensions to party leadership as does the Tribune.

Resolved, That so long as these papers persecute their present course they should be refused the patronage and support of the true Republicans of this city; and further

Resolved, That the Pingree Republican clubs of the upper peninsula be asked to join with this club in taking the action indicated toward Mr. Scripps' newspapers so long as they continue their present course.

Everybody for Pingree.
There was a fair attendance at the meeting of the Pingree Workers club at the old armory of the Marquette Rifles last night. George Wagner presided. Frank Ralph was elected secretary in place of W. J. Ellison, who was unable to serve. A committee was appointed to make arrangements for the reception to Mayor Pingree when he visits Marquette Saturday of next week. Speeches enjoining Mr. Pingree were made by E. D. Cox and others. The club then adjourned subject to call.

Another Old Settler Gone.
Mr. Petrus Bystrom, residing at 334 W. Bluff street, died of congestion of the lungs at 3:05 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. Bystrom was born at Beckefors, in the province of Dalsland, Sweden, on the 14th day of February, 1832. He emigrated in 1868 and came to this place from Chicago in 1869. His wife died in 1875, leaving him alone with four sons who survive him, three residing at Marquette and one at Green Bay, Wis. Since 1876 he has been an employe of the D., S. S. & A. R'y Co., working as blacksmith. He has been an earnest and faithful member of the Swedish Lutheran Messial church since its organization. Mr. Bystrom was a man of an earnest Christian character, respected and honored by all. The funeral will take place Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, when services will be held in the Swedish Lutheran Messial church.

Died of Pneumonia.
Mrs. Angeline Crusher, wife of Joseph Crusher, died of pneumonia at her home, 117 Furnace street, yesterday morning after an illness of three weeks. The funeral will be held at 9 o'clock Monday morning from the French Catholic church, with interment in the old Catholic cemetery. Mrs. Crusher was born at St. Felix, Quebec, and was 75 years of age at the time of her death.

Work of Children's Home.
The Upper Michigan Children's Home society is now housed at the corner of Arch and Front street, a very suitable location. The house is in every respect

the most suitable that could be secured for this purpose. While the rooms are not large, there are enough of them to do good work, as it is very desirable that the little strangers as they come into the hands of the society should at once be made to feel that they are living in a world different from the one in which they have been in the past.

As most of them come from very destitute homes, they are in need of clothing, and the superintendent, Rev. Holzhausen, would be pleased to accept any garments for children from one to twelve years. At the present time there are six children in the care of the society, twin babies a little less than two years of age, two girls of nine, one boy of eleven and one boy of twelve years.

A New England Comedy.

The girls have made a statement which it is understood implicates several men in their downfall, and further arrests are not improbable. Both of the erring damsels belong to respectable families, and until recently they have had good reputations. Mike Doyle and James Crowe are two other prisoners picked up by the marshal and turned over to the sheriff this week. Each is serving ninety days for indecent and disorderly conduct.
