EFFORTS TO ADD TARIFF AMEND-MENTS ARE DEFEATED.

Senate Declines to Come to Agreement With the House as to Battleships and on the Sectarian Question

THE CONGRESSIONAL DOINGS. Washington, June 4.—The senate this congress today. Late in the day the filled cheese bill was passed as it 13, thus completing the legislation on this subject.

The measure is analogous to the oleomargarine law. The bill defines "filled importation of meat, cattle almost entirely of silver men. cheese" to embrace "all substances and hides from countries with Immediately upon reassem made of milk or skimmed milk with admixture of butter, animal oils or fats. regetables or any other oils, or compounds foreign to such milk, and made in imitation of semblance of cheese.' Manufacturers of filled cheese are taxed one cent per pound and imported filled cheese is taxed eight cents per pound, in addition to import duty.

It is provided that filled cheese shall be packed by manufacturers in wooden packages only and branded with the words "Filled Cheese" in black face letters not less than two inches in length. It is also provided that all retail and wholesale dealers in filled cheese shall display in a conspicious place in their salesrooms a sign bearing the words "Filled Cheese Sold Here" in black faced letters not less than six inches in length, upon a white ground.

Several efforts to add tariff amend-Several efforts to add tariff amendments to the bill were defeated. An amendment by Stewart for a tax of ten cents per pound on wool was laid on the table, 32 to 24. Another amendment, by Lindsay, repealing the one-eighth differential duty on sugar was tabled, 31 to 16. Vest spoke in opposition to the filled cheese bill. He said the oleomargarine law had turned out to benefit Nelson. Morris and Armour, who added the oleomargarine tax to the product sold to the people, and this law would operate in the same way.
