FARE IS NOW A NICKEL.

Street Car Directors Make a Five Cent Rate to all Points.

PRESQUE ISLE NOW ACCESSIBLE TO THE WORKINGMAN.

Houghton Plays Marquette Two Days at the Fair Grounds—No Racing this Season—Another Run for Lady Cyclers Wednesday.

FIVE CENT FARES.

Beginning today the universal fare on the street railway will be five cents for any distance. Ten cent fares were done away with at a directors' meeting held yesterday afternoon. It will soon be possible to ride the distance from Hotel Superior to Presque Isle for a single nickel.

This is the biggest innovation into the methods of the street car company that the organization has made since its establishment here. It is an innovation that will be hailed with delight by the general public, and especially by the working man and clerk who has had daily occasion to ride past the five cent limit. For them it means a considerable item of daily expense cut in half, and it is the general belief of the business men of the town that it means an increased revenue for the railroad.

Marquette has stood nearly alone among the cities of the United States with a car line which demanded a ten cent fare. Indeed it has become almost an unwritten law that the fare of a street car is five cents, regardless of the length of the haul, or the original expense of building the line.

In some cities a vigorous agitation is going on now for a three cent fare, and with the reduction there is usually demanded a better service in speed and cars. But three cent fares are beyond the wildest dreams of Marquette residents and every man, woman and child in the municipality is figuratively throwing up his hat or bonnet in honor of the great cut.

It is expected that the number of passengers who will take the ride out to Presque Isle will now be far more than doubled, and unless it is the company cannot hope to come out even on the reduction.

The present cut is somewhat in the nature of an experiment, and unless the receipts keep up at the normal figure it cannot be maintained long. What the rate is to be in the future depends upon the amount of travel, especially upon the amount of extra travel that the reduction draws.

When the open motor car is put on next week it will be hard to find a more pleasant trip in the late afternoon or early evening than a little excursion to Presque Isle, and every one who indulges himself makes the five cent rate just that much more likely to be permanent. There is now no reason why even a working man cannot afford to take his wife and family and spend a pleasant Sunday or holiday afternoon on Marquette's wonderful natural pleasure ground.

Baseball Two Days.

Marquette's baseball club has sworn to redeem itself in the eyes of its admirers for the defeats it suffered at Duluth, by making a terrible example of the Houghton aggregation, which plays here Saturday and Sunday.

If it is going to be a battle of pitchers Houghton ought to put up a good game, as she comes fortified with three twirlers. Besides that the club has shown itself to be one of the strongest batting teams in the peninsula. In the recent game with Baraga they hammered Berriman, Baraga's crack pitcher, for sixteen singles, a pair of two base hits, and a triple. The home team doesn't ask anybody to come out and see it do a cake walk.

From now on some very desirable changes will be in order. The management wants it understood that it will no longer tolerate mere spectators on the player's bench. The only people who are entitled to seats there are players, scorers and reporters. The police have been instructed to clear the bench of all others. Herebefore players who have been playing in the hot sun of the diamond have come in tired, and been unable to find seats on their bench because it was crowded with a lot of rooters who took possession of it because it was a good place to see the game from.

Another reform is to be inaugurated. This is for the accommodation of out of town patrons. In order to give up the road people a chance to see the entire nine innings hereafter the Sunday game will be called promptly at 3, thus enabling them to catch the 5:30 train for home.

Christopher Columbus Excursion.

Sometime this morning the great whaleback steamer, Christopher Columbus, will make her appearance in Marquette harbor.

Two grand excursions are to be given out of here, one leaving at 2 in the afternoon, and the other at 7:30 in the evening. Trip tickets in either case are fifty cents, but the little folks go for half fare.

Special excursions have been arranged by the South Shore to enable those living up the road to take advantage of this rare opportunity, as well as those whose home is right on the lake. The railroad makes a rate of fifty cents for the round trip to Ishpeming and Negaunee people, and residents of Champion and Republic may go and return for seventy-five cents each. The train schedule is very convenient, both for going and coming.

Such a rare opportunity as the coming of the monster Columbus into port

is something that the intelligent and pleasure loving people of the vicinity will not let slip by unimproved, and it is safe to say that despite its enormous carrying capacity, the biggest on the lakes, the great excursion steamer will be comfortably crowded on each trip.

Racing Deal Off.

Marquette will not be on the racing circuit of the upper peninsula, not this year at least.

Messrs O'Meara and Stewart secured from Mayor Jacobs a week or so ago the lease of his racing track for one year for the sum of \$1 and the necessary repairs. Looking it over then they thought the repairs would not be particularly expensive, but since then they have come to the conclusion that the expense would be too heavy to bear between them for only two days racing, and that in competition with two ball games and a full fledged fourth of July celebration.

Mr. O'Meara says that they wanted the mayor to take a one third interest in the project, help find the purses and take his chances on the profits with them, but his honor would do nothing except to clear the grubs off the park and scrape the track.

"Racing is off as far as we're concerned," said Mr. O'Meara to a MINING JOURNAL reporter yesterday.

Another Ladies' Run.

The first cycling run for ladies having proven such an immense success the gentlemen of the Kitchimikana have decided to have another similar spin next Wednesday night. In addition to the other attractions of the run, a supper will be served at Presque Isle on the northwest side of the island.

Last night the fast riders of the club took a lively spin over the usual course, stopping awhile at the end to discuss the part the cycling club should take in the coming Fourth of July celebration. The boys decided to enter enthusiastically in the plans for the jollification and to help it on in any way they could by a parade or wheelmen's demonstration.
