The Boards Should Be Prepared Before They Are Laid. To secure a perfectly-polished floor

the work must be begun on the ma terial before putting down. The boards should be thoroughly kiln-dried and then gone over with two or three coats of linseed oil, applied when at the boiling point. If the boards are put into the kiln between applications and dried, so much the better. They may then be put down with reasonable confidence that every little bit of dampness will not swell or warp them out of shape. If boards are not so treated be fore putting down it will be necessary to be careful about spilling water on them, as they will almost certainly spring up, and may warp entirely out of control. The hot oil put on while the boards are in the raw state penetrates them evenly all over, and there are no exposed places where moisture can creep in.

Floors that have been put down before being treated must be smoothed and all cracks and nail holes filled with putty, in which a very little plaster of paris is mixed. Three or four coats of boiling oil will be the best body for any polish to be applied. Some workmen use what is called a wood-filler, a substance that is readily absorbed into the grain of the wood and makes it hard and firm. If a special color is required a liquid stain without oil or should be first applied. This is better if put on very hot, as it sinks into the wood better and is much more durable It should be laid on very rapidly and smoothly with a wide, thick brush and with strokes lengthwise of the boards. Ample time must be given for this to dry before any other coat is applied; then, when thoroughly dry, put on hot

Saturated with color, kiln-dried and should be unused for some days after an oil polish is applied. If they could be left for several weeks they would be very much better, but this is rarely possible, except it be done just befor one goes away for the summer, or the house is so situated that the room can be closed for some time.-N. Y. Ledger



#### RAILROADING IN THE ROCKIES.

A Wild and Woolly Circumstance of

Down-Grade Run. "Speaking of wild rides," said the stranger from the west, "why, the fellows here ain't in it, that's all. I remember one night that we broke in two six or seven times while coming down Laramie hill in the Rockies. We didn't stop to couple up, as they do here, but coupled the train together again while it was running down hill at a speed of 45 miles an hour. course, this is a trifle risky for a beginner, but we soon get used to it and familiarity with danger insures contempt. Once in awhile one of the boys falls under the wheels. But it is instant death, and he really doesn't know what hit him.

"All the cars are provided with air yet we were compelled to sit on deck and watch out for accidents. 

The processes are easy enough and the cure need not last longer than ten days or three weeks, for by that time

In the spring, of course, every sensi-ble woman voluntarily goes a-dieting, and those who don't know how should first cut down their allowance of tea to not more than one cup in 24 hours. Oranges and Boston brown bread she can in dulge in freely, but during the three weeks of dieting no pastry, sweets chocolate, rich salads or fried dishes must she touch. If at odd times genuin hunger drives her to the pantry, a bowl of milk and whole-wheat crackers will stifle the cravings, and only rare meat boiled vegetables and green salads are

allowable on the list of earnest acetics. toilet, she should sip a cup of cold or very hot water, and then, after a cold sponge bath, wash her face in tepid water, er riched with the suds of good eastile soap. After this the basin must be half filled with the milkman's best quality of rich and skimmed milk, and the soothing liquid dashed with her barhand over every feature from chin to brow.
