ses of nervous disease is due directly or indirectly to the action of different forms of bacteria, or disease germs. Nealy all the forms of meningitis or brain fever are due to the direct action of different forms of bacteria upon the membranes that cover the brain. Other forms of nervous disease are now thought to be of infectious nature, due to some infectious nature, due to some specific organism. Others still are due to the action of poisons produced by which is due, not to any weakness of the nervous system, but to the action of the diphtheritic poison upon the peripheral nerves. Similar forms of paralysis may follow smallpox, typhoid fever, pneumonia or influenza. Many of the seases of the spinal cord are of similar origin. Locomotor ataxia and general paresis, two common and fatal diseases are in most cases the result of one of these infectious diseases .- Dr. Philip C. Knapp, in Century.
