AN OUDINANCE An ordinance regulating the sanitary con dition of barber shops.

The city of Marquette ordains: Sec. 1. That the following rules and regu lations for the guidance, continuous ob servance and practice of barbers in said eity be and they are hereby adopted and prescribed, and copies thereof to be furnished by the health officer, shall be kept conspicuously posted in each and every barber shop by the proprietor or person in charge thereof.

Each and every barber while practicing his trade shall keep his hands in a sanitary condition by paring and cleaning his finger nails and washing his hands immediately before any operation incident to his trade upon any person, in one of the following solutions: Mercury bichloride, one part to two thousands parts of water, or carbolic acid or creoline, thirty drops to a pint of water.

Each and every barber shall immediately before every cutting operation incident to his trade performed by him, disinfect all razors, clippers, scissors and other tools used in such operations by dipping the cutting portions of such instruments in a bath of undiluted carbolic acid and then wash- AT :ing the whole instrument in either the carbolic acid or creoline solution specified under Rule ! above, and drying the same upon a towel specially reserved for such purpose, and shall disinfect all strops, combs and brushes immediately before

RULE III. No barber shall use upon or about any person being operated on by him any towel or napkin which has been previously used on or about any other person unless





It is said that camphor can be produced from other species of trees. In Borneo very aromatic camphor is obtained from the natural deposit of gum on the trunks of a species of tree indigenous to that island and Sumatra. It must be explained, however, that many of the vessels which sail the Baltic seas are old and worn, having failed to pass the board of trade survey and therefore sold to the Swedes and Norwegians for the Baltic sea trade.—Chicago News.






