ASSURED OF EASTERN AID.

Every Indication That Bryan Will Have Support of the New York Leaders.

CANDIDATE IS FLOODED WITH INVITATIONS TO SPEAK.

Bryan Sceptical of Promise of Support Attributed to Hill, Who Usually Speaks for Himself—Mercurial Gold Men.

STAYING AT UPPER RED HOOK.

UPPER RED HOOK, N. Y., Aug. 21.—Every indication here today has been towards this settled fact, that Bryan expects and has been assured of eastern support. Letters continue pouring in asking him to speak at eastern points, and if the requests were heeded he could spend the entire time from now until election day in New York state. Nearly every city of any size between New York and Chicago has asked him to make a stop, and without exception the invitations come from the leaders of Democratic organizations.

Bryan showed no surprise at the newspaper stories that the New York Democratic state organization had decided to support him. He did reflect a little bit upon the statement that Senator Hill had told Danforth he would support and work for him (Bryan). He said in relation to that proposition: "It is not Hill's custom to speak through others and I do doubt if Danforth gave out the statement purporting it to be made by Hill. The senator will probably make his own announcement."

It was said here today on good authority that Hill would take part in the demonstration in honor of Bryan at Albany Tuesday night. The statement needs confirmation, however. The published statement that Richard Croker had approved Sheehan's and Tammany's course in endorsing Bryan caused the candidate a great deal of satisfaction and he said he had always believed all the great leaders would fall into line, except, perhaps, those who had financial interests with the gold side of the issue, thus intimating that the leaders in gold the Democratic movement had mercenary interests.

Bryan's speech at Tivoli tomorrow is expected to be delivered before five or six thousand people and his preparations today would seem to indicate it to be the greatest effort made since his Madison Square Garden speech. It will be political in its tone and will, perhaps, attempt to answer in part Cockran's speech.

FIXING THE SLATE.

Populists and Democrats in Idaho Have a Time of It.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 21.—At six this evening the Democratic and Populist state conventions had not completed their work. The arrangement respecting United States Senator Dubois does not please the Populists and they spent the entire day trying to get it straightened out, the last demand being that the Democrats shall agree to support any one selected by the Populist legislative caucus. The Populists did nothing more than adopt their platform. It endorses the action of the national People's party at St. Louis. The Democratic convention has gone ahead faster. It adopted a platform and nominated R. P. Quarles of Salmon for supreme judge and Frank Stuenberg of Caldwell for governor. The platform endorses the platform adopted at the Chicago convention; ratifies the nominations made at Chicago and pledges the use of every honorable effort to secure the election of Bryan and Sewall. At the evening session the Democrats notified the Populists they would accede to the last demand. The Populists at once receded and the fusion was closed up. Nominations are now progressing.

WANTS TO MEET COCKRAN.

Tillman Would Like to Pitchfork Bourke's Speech.

MOUNT GERRA, Pa., Aug. 21.—The farmers' encampment at this place today was enlivened by the presence of Senator Tillman of South Carolina, who spoke on the money question. He denied the charges of some eastern papers that he was a Populist. He said: "I'm a Democrat, a Democrat of the stamp of Jefferson and Jackson."

He advised the farmers to read their histories and said they would know then that Lincoln, if he was alive, would be on the side of silver. This statement brought forth a number of hisses. Nothing daunted, however, the senator continued and said he would like to meet Bourke Cockran to refute some statements made by him.

TWICE DISCREDITED NOW.

So Rev. Brown Says of Mattie Overman's Testimony.

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—Rev. C. O. Brown, formerly of San Francisco, and whose troubles are familiar to all newspaper readers, has made a statement in reply to the last confession of Miss Overman, in which she says that the charges which she originally made against Brown, and which she subsequently said were false, are in reality founded on fact. Brown denounces the entire story as one of blackmail and says that the fact Miss Overman now admits she testified falsely should place her unworthy of the slightest credence. He says:

"The public should remember that Miss Overman wrote offering to have Mrs. Thunnell make an affidavit in my favor if I would pay a large sum for it, but that my enemies were ready to pay well for a story against me, and that they should sell such a story unless I

pay them their price. This is just what they have done. Of course, those who have been willing to pay five hundred dollars or a thousand for such a story were shrewd enough to see that its value would be increased by being recited to the conference. I do not accuse the members of the conference of making such bargains. Whoever paid the money, however, told Miss Overman she must get her story before that body. But why should the conference listen to Miss Overman? They affirmed again and again that her testimony in my favor was worthless because she was a discredited woman. Is she less discredited now that she affirms that she is a perjurer? If she was discredited before, she is twice discredited now."

MUST ALL FUSE IN IDAHO.

Committees Say Silver Republicans Must Not Be Frozen Out.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Senator Butler, chairman of the Populist committee, says he has been receiving some favorable reports from different states where there have been disagreements between Populists and Democrats as to fusion on electors. It is now believed that the offer of the Populists in Texas to take seven of the fifteen electors will be accepted. In West Virginia the committees have agreed upon a division and it is also stated that the chances for fusion in North Carolina are improved. It was stated at Populist headquarters that they believed in Idaho a fusion would be arranged so as to give the silver Republicans a share of offices and an equal interest in the campaign, electors to be divided among the three parties. The national Populist committee, it was stated, will insist upon this, and will be joined in it by the Democratic national committee.

Chairman Babcock had a call today from a friend who had wheeled all the way from Chicago to New York and then to Washington. The young man is the son of a Republican leader in Chicago and took an interest in the political situation in the various states through which he passed. He told Babcock he found the Republicans united and solid in Indiana, and the same condition existing in northern Ohio, but in the southern part of the state he found considerable silver sentiment among the Republicans. In Delaware and New Jersey the Republicans said they were sure to win. In western New York he found a good deal of silver talk even among Republicans. Upon the whole he reported the outlook favorable.

Secretary Gardner's national association of Democratic clubs today received applications for membership in the national association from thirty-four new clubs, Virginia heading the list. The situation in Idaho continues to worry managers in both Populist and Democratic headquarters. The fusion effected yesterday by the Democrats and Populists, which ignores the silver Republicans, they believe will react throughout the entire west and greatly embarrass and hamper their campaign. An adjustment of the matter which will give a proper recognition to the silver Republicans is regarded at both headquarters as of the highest importance.

CARVED IT SLIGHTLY.

Quarter Second Clipped Off World's Pacing Stallion Record.

RIDGYPARK, Me., Aug. 21.—The famous pacing stallion Joe Patchen lowered the world's stallion pacing record by one-quarter second, going a mile in 2:03 flat on Ridgypark track this afternoon. Two of the judges' watches showed the time to be one-fifth of a second less than 2:03. After a mile warming-up the black stallion driven by Joe Curry started with a runner known as Little Friend driven by Charles O'Brien. A strong head wind was blowing. The judges caught the quarter in 30 3/4, and with the wind at his back the famous stallion reeled off the second quarter in 29 3/4. The half was made in just one minute. On the third quarter the time was 30 3/4 seconds, and at two minute clip Joe Patchen gathered himself for the last quarter but here he met the strong wind again, against which he slowed down a bit, but crossed wire in 32 3/4 seconds. The announcement of a mile in 2:03 flat, one quarter second better than the world's stallion pacing record held by John R. Gentry, set the crowd wild. They lifted Curry, the driver, out of his sulky, swarmed from the grand stand onto the track and cheered like mad men. Patchen's former record was 2:04. He also holds world's record on half mile track, 2:05 3/4, made at Mystic last week.

LONG LOCKOUT ENDED.

Union Men May Work Again for the U. S. Glass Co.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 21.—Notices were posted today in the south side factories of the United States Glass company, now operating, announcing an indefinite shut-down. Individual notices were given the non-union workmen employed by the company since it locked out the American Flint Glass Workers' union members three years ago that their services are not likely to be needed again. This may mean the ending of one of the greatest industrial conflicts ever fought in this country and it is probable the factories of the company throughout the country will be open again to union workmen and the long lockout terminated. The notice of dismissal was wholly unexpected by the non-union men and greatly angered them. They are in poor circumstances to stand the loss of work any length of time.

Suffered Vile Indignities.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—T. P. O'Connors, Sun publishes a column of sensational account of the condition of John Daly, Irish political prisoner, just released. It says Daly will eventually prove the Irish dynamite have been subjected to indignities and punishment the vilest criminals in British prisons escaped.

PROGRAM FOR VICEROY LI.

Chinese Statesman and Ambassador Will Meet Cleveland in New York.

WILL MEET THE CHINESE REPRESENTATIVES AT A RECEPTION.

Washington, West Point and Niagara Falls Chief Other Places Visited. Canadian Representatives Meet Him at the Falls.

HE IS THE NATION'S GUEST.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—John Seager, private secretary to the secretary of war, today gave out the following program for the entertainment of Li Hung Chang while in this country:

Li Hung Chang arrives at New York by steamship St. Louis, Aug. 28. Major General Ruger, U. S. A., commanding the department of the east, who has been designated by the president to act as his representative will meet him on arrival and escort him with a detachment of the Sixth regiment United States Cavalry to the Waldorf Hotel, where he will remain during his stay in New York as a guest of the nation. General Ruger will attend the viceroy during his sojourn in this country and be in charge of all arrangements pertaining to his visit. The president of the United States, who is to be in the city as the guest of ex-Secretary of the Navy Whitney, will receive the special ambassador at the latter's residence the following day, the secretary of the treasury, secretary of war, and possibly other members of the cabinet being present.

Sunday a visit will be made to General Grant's tomb at Riverside. Monday will be spent in a trip to the military academy at West Point. Tuesday the party will be entertained at lunch by representative business men of New York, and later in the day an opportunity will be given the Chinese residents of the city to meet by arrangement with the Chinese consul. Wednesday will be occupied by a visit to Brooklyn. Thursday the party goes to Philadelphia and Friday and Saturday are to be spent in Washington. Sunday will be passed at Niagara Falls, where the viceroy will be met by a representative of the Canadian government who will escort him to Vancouver, from which port he sails for home.

PLOT IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Separatist Conspiracy to Shake Off the Spanish Yoke.

MADRID, Aug. 21.—An official dispatch from Manila announces the discovery in the Philippine islands of a separatist conspiracy, the object being to secure independence from Spain. According to the official advices twenty-one persons have been already arrested, several being Free Masons. The news caused great excitement in Madrid and the police in consequence tonight raided the Hispano Philippine club and seized a large quantity of papers. While commenting on the outbreak in the Philippine islands in the senate today Castellano, minister of the colonies, read several telegrams from the governor of the islands, Captain General Blance. These telegrams were to the effect that the conspirators aimed to secure complete independence for the Philippine islands. Nearly all the opposition leaders declared the liberal party was prepared to support all government measures necessary for the maintenance of Spanish integrity.

PYTHIANS ARE GATHERING.

Greatest Meeting of the Order Ever in Ohio.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 21.—Arrangements are completed for the great encampment of the Uniformed Rank Knights of Pythias, which begins tomorrow. This will be the largest gathering of Pythians ever seen in Ohio, if not in the country. It is now assured that at least 15,000 knights in uniform will be here. The encampment lasts all next week. Events of the week will be the grand parade Tuesday, and the grand Thursday and awarding prizes Friday. The supreme lodge meets Tuesday next. There will also be a meeting of the two auxiliary Pythian societies, the Rathbone Sisters and the Pythian Sisterhood, both of which orders will be represented by a large number of delegates.

The Khorasan Knights will give an illuminated parade Wednesday night.

The board of control of the endowment rank will also meet next week in executive session, and the supreme tribunal, or highest judicial authority, will also have a sitting.

DEFEW PRESIDED.

Held the Chair at the Bar Association Banquet.

SARATOGA, Aug. 21.—Chauncey M. Depew tonight presided at the annual banquet of the American Bar association which was enjoyed by about two hundred and sixty distinguished persons in the Grand Union Hotel ballroom. It was preceded by a reception in the club rooms adjoining, when Lord Russell, Sir Francis Lockwood and Montague Crackenthorpe again met the members of the association. Among the speakers at the banquet were Chauncey M. Depew, Lord Russell, Moorfield Storey of Boston, Sir Francis Lockwood and Bourke Cockran.

HOUGHTON COUNTY'S VALUATION. Covers the Ground.

The following ordinance, recently adopted by the village of Houghton, will tend to put a quietus on a discussion dating further back than the memory of the oldest inhabitant.

The Village of Houghton Ordains:

Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful to cause, suffer or permit any diseased or old or infirm animal to run at large within the said village; or to cause, suffer or permit any hog, horse, colt, mule, bull, ox or steer to run at large within the corporate limits of said village; or to cause, suffer or permit any cow to run or remain at large within the corporate limits of said village between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful to cause, suffer or permit any horse or other animal to stand or remain upon any street, alley or public place within said village unless the same be held by a person of suitable age or be securely hitched or tied, or be anchored with a sufficient weight. Any person violating any of the provisions of the several sections of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than five dollars or by imprisonment not exceeding ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, together with the costs of prosecution, in the discretion of the court.

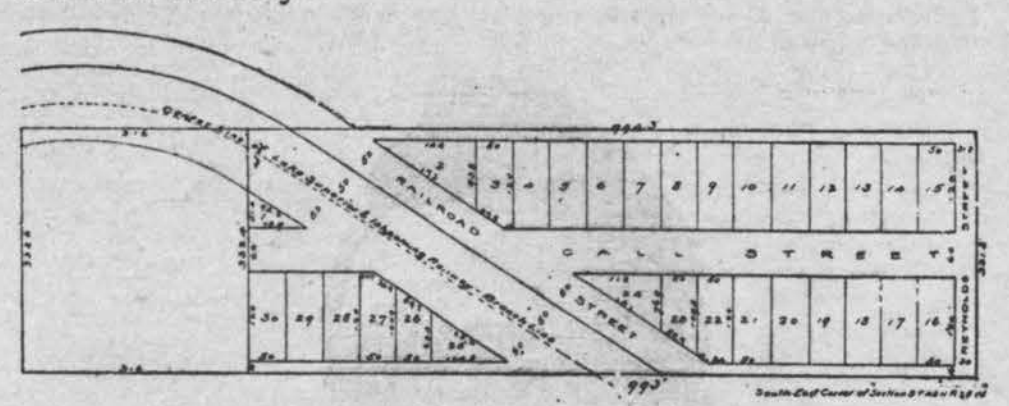

In Good Condition.

The circular issued by the directors of the Boston & Montana Mining company July 15 stated that the company had sold its product sufficiently ahead to warrant the payment of the \$1 extra dividend then declared out of earnings and another dividend of like amount in November without interfering with the plan of paying regular quarterly dividends of \$2 per share and adding \$1,000,000 to the surplus of the company. Boston & Montana has doubtless nearly two months product yet to sell to complete its year's production. If this product is well sold it is of course among the possibilities that the company may disburse from one to two dollars additional as a result of this year's operations.

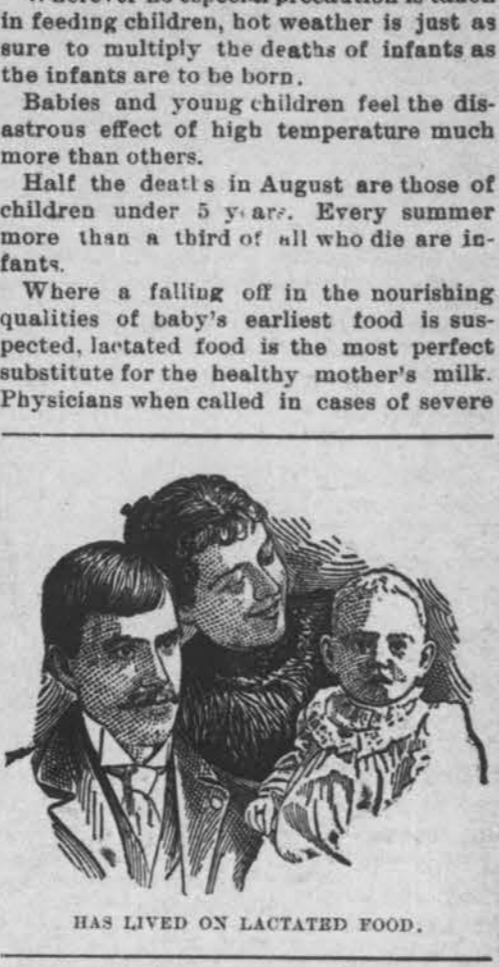
