

### AN INDIAN TROY.

After Twenty Centuries of Burial It Is to Be Excavated.

At last the ruins of the Indian Troy, deeply buried in the debris of over 22 centuries, are likely soon to see the light. Pataliputra, the "Palibothra" of the Greeks, the "city of sweet-scented flowers," so famous in ancient Indian legend and romance, is perhaps most widely known as the capital of Asoka, the greatest of Indian emperors, and the most lavish devotee the world has ever seen. He covered his mighty kingmusket to defend our country during dom from Afghanistan to the Deccan, the civil war, one of those who voted from Nepal to Gujerat, with countless Buddhist monuments and buildings of vast size. His stupendous stupas or mounds of solid masonry to enshrine Buddha's relics, or to mark some sacred spot, are found all over India, and are almost like Egyptian pyramids in size. His colossal edict pillars, single shafts of stone over 40 feet in length and beautifully polished and sculptured, still excite the wonder and admiration of all who see them. 

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



### LENSES ARE READY.

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Big Glasses for Yerkes' Telescope May Be Shipped This Fall.

The Building at Evanston Almost Ready to Receive Them-Care That Will Be Taken in Transporting Them.

It is probable that the big lenses which Alvin Clark has made at Cambridge, Mass., for the University of Chicago's mammoth Yerkes telescope will be shipped to their destination some time this fall. The lenses have been finished for some time, and the question of shipping them now lies with the officials of the University of Chicago and not with Mr. Clark. The delay is caused by the fact that the building which is to receive the glass is not yet completed.

The tube and machinery of the telescope are all ready, and have been so for about two years, but the lenses are of such priceless value that it is not thought best to ship them until they can be sent direct to their ultimate resting place so that they will have to go through only one journey. The building will probably be completed this fall. If it is, the glass will then be shipped at once, but if not the glass may not be sent until next spring, as, owing to the brittleness caused by cold weather, it is not thought best, as a rule, to move large lenses like this in the winter if it can be avoided.

Even if shipped in warm weather, the care which will be taken of the glass will be something remarkable, and the chance of breakage reduced almost to an impossibility. When each lense has been packed separately they will both be ready for shipment to Chicago, and this shipment will be made in a parlor car, chartered especially for the purpose. ### A Stamp Machine.

A useful office appliance has been patented in Europe in the shape of an apparatus for attaching stamps to envelopes. A rectangular box is fitted to hold 200 stamps piled one on the other, gummed side down, with two little hooks at the bottom, holding the stamps in place. A downward pressure of a verticle handle fixed to the side of the box releases the two hooks and forces down a stamp on the moistened pad. It is claimed that with this apparatus envelopes can be stamped at the rate of 1,200 to 1,500 per hour. For general use a special stand is constructed, to carry boxes for three or more values of stamps, with the moistening pad in
