What Bryan Said in His Address to the Crowd There.

Boston, Sept. 27 .- Candidate Bryan arrived at Lynn this morning. He delivered a brief address and at once took the train for Boston. On the arrival in this city a quick trip was made across crowd in front of the city hall. Throughout his address he devoted himself to a discussion of the financial issue upon lines followed in previous said:

"You cannot find a correct definition of an honest dollar in a speech of any of the advocates of a gold standard who are talking this year. They will tell you that an honest dollar is a dollar which you can melt without its losing anything. Why, bless the ignorant heart of the man who gives that definition; he does not seem to know that the very that the gold dollar and the bullion at any time you want to."

Mr. Bryan argued there can be no material difference between bullion and coinage value, so long as one can be converted into the other at will. He continued:

'Some of our opponents have been make under free coinage in buying silver for twenty cents and having it coined into 100 cents. Now, my friends, if any of you held silver bullion would you sell it to anybody for half price and let the producer make the profit? Of course not. And yet you hear this argument every day by those who seem unable to comprehend even the plainest truths that we present in the money question.'

The speaker maintained that "in this contest we have arrayed against us all the combinations of wealth," and in conclusion, said :

"I want you to understand the importance of this controversy. It is a question whether the people have the right to govern themselves or whether these great corporations and syndicates and trusts own this government, and have the right to use it and plunder everybody else for the enrichment of themselves. In our platform we declare that the government is greater than trusts.

CURIOUS BALLOON EXPERIMENT Effort Made at Paris to Collect Atmos-

phere at a High Altitude. An interesting scientific experiment was made the other day in Paris with the aid of a balloon which was sent up from Villette at half-past ten. The object of the experiment, says the Westminster Gazette, was to collect a quantity of atmosphere at a very great altitude for purposes of analysis. The balloon was, therefore, sent up alone with the necessary instruments attached to it. These consisted of an entirely new kind of reservoir, capable of holding tap hermetically sealed, but so arranged with clockwork apparatus that it would open just one hour after the ascent and close again one minute later. A good deal of ingenuity had been displayed in this invention. In order to preserve

the reservoir from the intense cold of the upper regions, it was surrounded by a bath of soda-water, which was expected to keep the apparatus at an even temperature. In addition the balloon also carried two baro-thermographs for registration purposes at high altitudes. Attached to the balloon are instructions to those who may find it. so that it may be carefully wrapped up and forwarded to Paris forthwith.

In spite of the fact that the dogs often slept in the bake-oven and that kitchen utensils were not numerous, the food they provided was quite acceptable. The oldest member of the family was a woman 106 years old, an age which it is not uncommon for the women to attain. Numerous photographs and some very fine pottery were obtained.
