A POPULAR FALLACY. Fait in Temperature of Ocean Does Not

Indicate Presence of Ice. For many years an opinion existed among seamen and others that a fall in the sea-surface temperature implied nearness of ice. Nothing, says the Nautical Magazine, can be more remote from the truth, though shore folk still perpetuate this fiction in books and newspapers. A sudden fall in seasurface temperature is likely near the Agulhas, the Japanese current, the gulf stream, while running the Easting down in the South Indian ocean, in the South Atlantic about 40 degrees south, 40 degrees west, and elsewhere; and this, whether icel-rgs be near or hundreds of miles away. Capt. S. T. S. Lecky, R. N. R., to whom the nautical profession is indebted for his "Wrinkles in Practical Navigation," was probably the first to draw the attention of his brethren to this fact. In the ninth edition of his book he points out that "allied to fog in the question of danger from ice. Convict Labor Problem.

Warden Van Evera has submitted to the authorities at Lansing the biennial prison, located here. Mr. Van Evera devotes quite a part of the report to considering the question of convict labor.

In his report he says the convict labor question is the most serious one which has to be considered. The depressed condition of the country has made the ple die from lung troubies. competition with free labor in opposi-tion to the protest of the laboring men of the state when no profit is resulting to the state by the operation, is to my

mind, inexcusable.' Eleven men have been released from the prison on parole, one of whom has been returned for violation of his parole. Warden Van Evera thinks that the benefits to society from the system are not unmixed. "Whether or not the benefits," he says, "will be greater than the evils which may easily follow, a further experience and investigation of the system will be necessary in order to determine.
