

Residents of the state must take out a license costing fifty cents. No person shall be allowed to kill more than three deer in any one season and there shall be attached to each deer killed a coupon from the license. No transportation company shall carry deer out of the state except that it has a coupon from a non-resident's license

The secretary of state is to prepare the icense blanks and furnish them to the county clerks.

The fine for hunting deer without a icense shall be not less than \$50 nor more than \$100 or imprisonment in the county jail not more than ninety days.

Deer found in the possession of transportation companies contrary to the act shall be seized and sold by the game warden, one half of the money going to the state game warden and one-half to the deputy warden who seizes the deer. The game warden will attach a certificate to the deer which shall be equivalent to a license

Prosecutions under this law must be commenced within one year from the time the offense was committed.

LOST ON CORROBEDO ROCKS.

North German Lloyd Steamer Salier Is Wrecked Off Corunds. Spain.

WATERY GRAVES.

Ship Was Bound from Bremen Buenos Ayres and Carried 210 Passengare. Mostly Steerage, and a Crew of Sixty-Five.

AN APPALLING OCEAN DISASTER. Vigo, Spain, Dec. 16 .- The North German Lloyd steamer Salier has been lost off Coruna on the Corrobedo rocks, and all on board, passengers and crew, perished. There were 210 passengers, mostly steerage-113 Russians, 35 Galicians, 61 Spaniards and 1 German. The crew was composed of sixty-five men.

The Salier was bound from Bremen to Buenos Ayres, via Coruna and Villagarcia. The Corrobedo rocks are situated off the southwest coast of Coruna, and should have been given a wide berth before the steamer was headed direction for the bay leading up to Villagarcia.

London, Dec. 10.-The British ship Peer has been wrecked in Saldanha bay, South Africa. It is believed fourteen persons perished.

IN LONDON BARBER SHOPS. Shaving Mugs Adorned with Emblems of the Owner's Business.

An interesting feature of the east end barber shops is the rack of pigeonholes. filled with shaving mugs, each bearing, usually in German text, the name of the owner, says Pearson's Weekly. The many a mug bears, in addition to the owner's name, some emblem of his mug the picture of a richly-appointed hearse, with all the proper trappings of woe. The butcher decorates his mug with shoulders of mutton, pigs' heads and linked sausages. The dentist displays the traditional double row of annoyingly perfect teeth. A child's photograph occasionally appears on a shaving mug and now and then a coat of arms is emblazoned above the owner's name, for coats of arms are as abundant in the east end as elsewhere in the town. Sometimes it is a national coat of arms, German, Austrian, Swiss or Italian, displayed in honor of the deserted fatherland.

AIR FUEL FOR GUNBOATS. Interesting Experiments Being Made in the German Navy.

The German naval authorities have decided to partially heat the boilers of their men-of-war with oil. This new oil is called "neasut," says the Philadelphia Record. It is strictly a tar oil, a product of the distillation of lignite, and is dark brown in color. Several tanks will be constructed for it on each vessel, and from these tanks pipes will lead to the furnaces, and the oil will be conducted thereto through these From the pipes it will be ejected by

steam in a spray, and the resulting flame is very bright and absolutely smokeless. So far as its heating power is concerned, it is declared to be greatly superior to coal. HOLY PILLAR OF ST. PETER. Witches Were Bound to It to Exorcise the Spirit.

In a small chapel stands a strangely wrought marble column inclosed in an iron cage, says Marion Crawford in the Century. The Romans now call it the Colonna Santa (the holy pillar) and it is said to be the one against which Christ leaned when teaching in the temple at Jerusalem. A great modern authority believes it to be of Roman workmanship and of the third century, but those who have lived in the east will see much that is oriental in the fantastic, ornamented carving. It matters little. 

BOUNTIES ON SHIPPING.

Claims Will Soon Exceed the Grant. A curious difficulty has just arisen in Japan in connection with navigation bounties. Employment had to be found for all tonnage purchased during the war for transport and general military at the conclusion of the war became part of the general mercantile marine of the country. For this purpose, says the Manchester Guardian, new lines of steamers to Australia, India, the Pacific ports of the United States and European ports were subsidized under the terms of a law passed during the last session. A limit on the gross amount to be paid in bounties was fixed by the law. It now, appears beyond question that the claims under the provisions of the statute will vastly exceed the limit. During the ten years for which the policy of the act was to be in force the annual grant was to rise from about \$600,000 to \$1,000,000. But the government now finds that with the present activity in shiplast session. A limit on the gross that with the present activity in shipping enterprise in Japan two years hence the claims will be \$3,000,000, and at present far exceed the appropriation 174,000 Acres for Saleor Lease outset, and they cannot pay the claims if things go on as they are doing. Companies or lines obviously organized only for the purpose of earning the bounties or those of a speculative kind have their claims struck out. Even so, however, the substantial difficulty remains that genuine claims for the bounty are greatly in excess of the

Iron Quarries.

Very interesting facts, not generally known, about the iron mines of Spain were discussed at a recent meeting of the iron and steel institute of Great Britain. It is from northern Spain, in the neighborhood of Bilbao, that the greater part of the iron ore imported for the use of the British steel makers is obtained. Steel is made by the basic process from iron ore containing phosphorus; but for the best qualities of steel, which is made by the open hearth process, a purer ore must be used, and it is that which England imports from Spain. "Nature seems to have designated the hills of northern Spain especially for the use of the steel makers." Until recently practically no effort has been made to manufacture steel in Spain, and most of the ore has been exported to England. The iron mines of northern Spain are described as being rather quarries than mines in the ordinary sense of the word. "The mountains themselves are just heaps of iron ore covered naturally with but a thin layer of carth. This is removed, and it only remains to break up the ore and load it into fitting receptacles, when it is conveyed down to the water's edge by its own gravity."-Youth's Companion.

Human Coal. An English authority informs us that an audience of 2,000 people, listening for two hours to a concert, are not only cultivating and indulging their musical taste, but are engaged in the somewhat prosaic occupation of producing no less than 100 weight of coal and 17 gallons of water from the impurities and moisture of their own breath, and that if they were all performing themselves, instead of listening, this quantity would be nearly doubled. It is far more wholesome to drink the undiluted water of the Thames at Blackwall than to breathe the air of a crowded and unventilated room, and how cleanly people can be content to do so is only explicable on the principle that what the eye does not see the heart does not grieve over.




