

USING THE BIRD BOLAS. Hunting Wild Geese Without Gun, Pow der or Shot.

As all the things in the world which the men neglect have to be done by the vomen-good reason why their work never ends-and as they have never been taught tailoring, it comes about that the population of Iceland, outs' do of the capital, is one huge, preposterous misfit. Hence tailoring is put at the very head of the curriculum in the girls' high school which Mrs. Sigridr Magnussen has built for the better education of he Iceland girls.

She will part with the tears of her countrywomen, she says, only to dry them. A better day shall dawn for Iceland when she returns with the money of the wealthy

It is not true, according to Mrs. Magnussen, that the people of Iceland are habitually flocking about the shore, waiting to be taken off. They stay there because it is the best place for them. It is all lava further in. Just now they are afraid of going into the country for fear the mountains will open on them, literally and figuratively, but hey have not the least notion of desertng. The only considerable emigration from Iceland was during the hard years between the eruption and the "three winters." Then 10,000 of the people went to Canada, leaving 60,000 there; but there are to-day over 72,000 left. In pite of this growth there is elbow room yet in Iceland. It is just the size of Ohio, with 40,000 square miles of chiefly rock and lava, consequently it has a population something less than two to the square mile.-N. Y. Sun.


