WOMEN TAILORS IN ICELAND.

Wife of an English Professor Establishes a Novel School. Outside of the capital, Reykjavik, there has not been a tailor on Iceland in the memory of man. So the women have always had to make the men's clothes; for the Iceland men, when they are not occupied afield wringing a hard living out of the reluctant soil, are too busy telling stories of the great deeds of their fathers, the Erik Brighteyes and Skallagrím Lambtails of a heroic past, to bother with trousers and such things.

As all the things in the world which the men neglect have to be done by the women—good reason why their work never ends—and as they have never been taught tailoring, it comes about that the population of Iceland, outside of the capital, is one huge, preposterous misfit. Hence tailoring is put at the very head of the curriculum in the girls' high school which Mrs. Sigridr Magnussen has built for the better education of the Iceland girls.

THE Iceland mother is, in fact, the universal schoolmistress of the land, and it was so that she might be fitted for the place that Mrs. Magnussen built her school. It stands, or stood, on a patch of ground in Reykjavik, upon which the builder was born. Just now she is very much troubled by the news of the great earthquakes up there, and by the dread that the school may have fallen down; in which case she will have to do it all over again.

THE people froze in July and not a blade of grass grew. There had never been such a season since anybody could remember. Men and cattle starved, and it was then that the women, to keep life in themselves, and those dear to them, surrendered the heirlooms jealously guarded for ages to buy bread. This is the treasure that Mrs. Magnussen has brought to New York. She will part with the tears of her countrywomen, she says, only to dry them. A better day shall dawn for Iceland when she returns with the money of the wealthy Americans.

It is not true, according to Mrs. Magnussen, that the people of Iceland are habitually flocking about the shore, waiting to be taken off. They stay there because it is the best place for them. It is all lava further in. Just now they are afraid of going into the country for fear the mountains will open on them, literally and figuratively, but they have not the least notion of deserting. The only considerable emigration from Iceland during the hard years between the eruption and the "three winters." Then 10,000 of the people went to Canada, leaving 60,000 there; but there are to-day over 72,000 left. In spite of this growth there is elbow room yet in Iceland. It is just the size of Ohio, with 40,000 square miles of chiefly rock and lava, consequently it has a population something less than two to the square mile.—N. Y. Sun.

NEW BOTTLING WORKS.
Bosch Brewing Co. Will Put in a Branch Establishment at Ishpeiming.

A bottling works will soon be established in Ishpeiming by the Bosch Brewing company of Lake Linden. The company has purchased the property on Pearl street, opposite Adolph's livery barn, from the Tislov estate, and the new enterprise will be launched there as soon as the place can be put in shape for it. The sheds at the rear of the lot are being torn down and a substantial barn will be built on their site. The barn will be large enough to accommodate three horses and will have separate rooms for grain, carriages, harness, etc.

The building on the front of the lot will be remodeled throughout. The front portion will be fitted up for a store or saloon. The rear will be occupied by the bottling works, refrigerator and office. A basement will be put underneath the entire building. The second floor will be fitted up for residence purposes. The improvements, aside from the equipment for the bottling establishment, will cost about \$2,000. The property was purchased for \$1,600, and was a bargain at that price.

C. A. Pearce, who is handling the company's business here, has worked up quite a good trade. He began business in this city less than a year ago. He is also receiving considerable patronage from the smaller towns west of here.

The Bosch Brewing company is quite an enterprising concern. It was established twenty-three years ago on a small scale. Its output last year was the third largest in the state. In bottled goods it will take the lead this year. There are some fine breweries in the lower peninsula but the Bosch is crowding them hard for first place in the amount of business done.

Boiling River
It is sure enough. It is not as large as the Mississippi, indeed it is quite small, but a mighty interesting stream for all that. It issues from the side of a mountain in a thousand tiny rills, more or less, and of almost as many colors. These gather themselves into pools and lakelets on the mountain's side, covering an area of about 200 acres. Overflowing their boundaries they slowly trickle down the sides of the mountain forming small cliffs, the most wonderful in the world. From a distance one can hardly believe what the eyesight reveals—white, black, orange, lemon, terra cotta, green, blue, red, pink, separate and in manifold combinations stand out before him. This then is Boiling river, an underground mountain stream of hot water.
