STRUCK BY A PURITY WAVE.

Gambling Dens and Resorts Are Cleared Out at One Fell Swoop.

SALOONS MUST OBSERVE ELEVEN O'CLOCK CLOSING LAW.

Dwyer Says He Can Throw Williams Ten Times an Hour—Last Court Case on Today—Union Prayer Week.

MORAL SPASM SEIZES THE CITY.

Liquor, liquor everywhere, but not a drop to drink, is a paraphrase of Coolidge's lines that applied in Marquette yesterday. It was the first dry Sunday the town has known for years.

The order has gone out that the saloons shall be made to keep the hours that are required by the city ordinances and state laws, and Marshal Emmons has ordered his men to keep a sharp lookout for violators.

In most saloons the array of bottles and cans was displayed in tantalizingly conspicuous style. Curtains were up, screens were drawn, and every obstruction to the gaze was removed that there might be no suspicion of illicit sales aroused.

But the saloons were not the only ones who were caught in the purity wave. The gambling den on Front street, which has been run for a month or more without the slightest attempt at concealment, and where everything was played from craps to stud poker, has been told to shut and stay shut, or stand a raid.

The Lake street resorts were given till today noon to close up and leave their present quarters, and the inmates were not slow in acting on the tip.

What started the movement is a question that is agitating people in quite diverse walks of life. "I don't know anything about it," said Mayor Jacobs when approached on the subject.

Another Challenge from Dwyer. Professor Dwyer doesn't consider that two wrestling matches on his hands at one time are enough. He wants a third.

This time he is after Professor George Williams. Mr. Dwyer says that Williams told one of his pupils that he was willing to wrestle Dwyer catch-as-catch-can if the latter would get down anywhere near his weight.

Now 165 pounds is the lowest Mr. Dwyer can train down to, but he wants a match with Williams and is willing to give a handicap, and has posted a \$25 forfeit with the reporter of THE MINING JOURNAL to show that he means business.

He will wrestle Mr. Williams in Marquette any time in the next two weeks, agreeing to throw Williams ten falls in sixty minutes. Should Williams get one down, or should he (Dwyer) fall to get ten downs in the given time the match goes to Williams.

Happenings at Court. Judge Stone devoted the entire day Saturday to hearing argument in two injunction cases, and then took them under advisement, and announced that he would hand down the decisions on them later.

These cases were the one brought by Scott & Morrison, owners of the Nester block, against the water board, and the Negaunee electric injunction case. Though no time was set the decision may be handed down today, as Monday's session will probably end the present term of court.

Probate Judge Clifton presided Saturday over a commission of lunacy which sat on the case of Mrs Emma Benital of Republic. The woman was declared

insane, and the judge went with her Sunday to Newberry, where she will be incarcerated in the asylum.

Two opinions seem to be held in Republic as to the woman's sanity. A reporter of THE MINING JOURNAL, who was a train coming out of Republic yesterday, heard four Republic women excitedly discussing the circumstances. They boldly asserted that her relatives on her husband's side had caused her to be examined for insanity and had so testified, in order that they might get \$3,500 which was left her at her husband's late and tragic death.

Mrs. Benital has four young children to whom she constantly begs that she may return. She was brought to Marquette Saturday by her sister-in-law accompanied by an officer.

Forming a Physical Culture Class.

About the first of the year Professor George Williams expects to begin a series of classes in physical culture.

Mr. Williams is a Marquette boy born and bred, but has been engaged in the profession of a physical director for eight years. He has numerous letters and press notices that testify in flattering terms to the merit of his system and his manner of teaching.

Speaking of his work Mr. Williams says: "Physical culture, in the broadest sense, when understood and practiced, fortifies the well against sickness; it gives one command over himself, his social and business interests. The work I do is founded upon a three years' course of instruction, where an intimate knowledge of anatomy and physiology are taught, together with all forms of gymnastic work in the fullest and best sense, including field sports, massage, Swedish movements, and the scientific use of water in the various baths."

Mr. Williams had an offer this fall of a good school position in the east, but as he was urged by a number of his friends to do so, he concluded to remain in Marquette and open a gymnasium. He will give a three month's course at the very reasonable figure of five dollars. He has already secured over fifty entries, which is enough to guarantee the success of the scheme if no more should join.

Among the Churches. Christians of all denominations will unite in a union watch-meeting New Year's eve. The meeting will be held in the Methodist church. It will begin at 9:30 and last till the year '97 has been ushered in.

The services will begin a week from tonight, but the arrangement for alternating is not yet decided upon.
