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

PRINCETON, Dec. 27.-The disastrous were lost. On account of gas it was some time before the work of rescue could begin. The first four men brought up were badly injured. 
The body of Robert Maule, son of President Maule and treasurer of the coal company, was found next, lying in a dump at the foot of the shaft. His

bones were broken. One other man is known to have been in the mine-Robert Poneylite, head blacksmith. The rescuers could not work long at a time, on account of the gas and foul air, and the search for Poneylite, which continued all day, has been of no avail. The injuries of some of the rescued men are very serious. The explosion is supposed to be from gas, which frequently accumulated in the pockets.
