LIKE TO HUNT BEARS. HOTELS

Kodiak Indians Have Not the Least Fear of Grizzlies. Some Strategy, a Little Grease and a Stout Spear Employed—Wonderful Tales of the Chase Brought from Alaska by H. J. Barling.

H. J. Barling, who is identified with the salmon industry of Alaska, as the owner of an extensive canning plant at Karluk, Kodiak island, has just arrived from the north. He brought down with him some of the largest bear skins ever seen in San Francisco.

One of them, a perfect and unblemished skin of an enormous grizzly, measures 12 feet from tip to tip. Mr. Barling has a marvelous tale to relate of the natives' way of killing a bear. "There are many grizzlies on Kodiak island," he said, "as well as a large number of cinnamon bears. I was cruising around in a launch in an unfrequented cove one day, when I spied two immense grizzlies. They were so large that I did not care to go after them, but when I got back to Karluk I communicated the fact to an Indian who bore the reputation of being one of the best bear hunters in that section."

"Although 52 years old, he had to ask his mother permission, which being granted he started across the country after the bears. Some of the natives of Kodiak use firearms on their hunting expeditions. This fellow simply armed himself with a long spear. He crept his head and got to windward of the animals. Pretty soon he heard a tramping in the brush and knew the prey was approaching. He dug a hole in the ground, planted one end of the spear firmly, with the point in the direction of the bear, and then crouched down. The bear came along and licked the head of the Indian. With a swift and dexterous movement the native cut a gash in the bear's neck with the sharp spear point. The angered animal drew back a few yards and made a rush. He impaled himself on the spear and all was over."

DEVOTED TO MONEY-MAKING. Despire His One Object He Only Accumulated About \$25,000. A man who devoted his whole life to making money has just died in a hospital in Louisville, Ky. He resolved never to marry, probably not wanting to bear the expense of supporting anyone but himself. His name was James Williams, and he was born in Pleasureville, Ky., in 1822.

When the gold fever broke out in 1849 Williams decided to go west in search of the yellow metal. He worked his way to California and made inquiry to where the gold fields were. He went to the placer mines in the Sacramento valley and began his search for gold. He worked diligently for weeks, but did not meet with success. He did not give up, however, and kept working away, hoping that each following day would bring him good luck.

He had been in the valley about two months, when one day, while drenching a bucket full of sand dirt, he discovered a small gold nugget. His first find was followed by many others and in the course of a few years he found himself the possessor of several thousand dollars.

When gold was discovered in Australia he left the field of California to try his fortune upon the Pacific continent. He met with fair success in Australia, but returned to this country four years afterward. He succeeded in amassing about \$25,000.

Several years ago he returned to Kentucky and had since made his home in Louisville. The immediate cause of his death was the grip.

BOY IN A PERMANENT TRANCE. In a Hypnotic State from Which He Cannot Be Aroused. Henry Westcott, of Forest City, N. Y., is said to be under a hypnotic spell from which he cannot be aroused. He has been a victim of epilepsy caused by smoking cigarettes. A couple of months ago a traveling hypnotist placed him under a spell and after the hypnotist had gone Westcott's companion began to operate upon him, and since that time it has been impossible to fully revive him, and he is slowly dying from its effects. The young man is the victim of severe attacks every night at eight o'clock, which last until morning. During this period he experiences terrible paroxysms. His muscles become rigid, finally relax and snap, when he will snarl and bite like a dog.

**WILL HAVE TWENTY PAGES.**

Woman's Edition Will Be the Largest Mining Journal Ever Gotten Out.

ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS ON SUBSCRIPTION IN A DAY.

Creditors Close Grabower-Williams Accepts Dwyer's Challenge Conditionally-Gifts for the Children-Auxiliary Lights Play Out.

**THEY HAD TO ENLARGE AGAIN.**

When the woman's edition of THE MINING JOURNAL was first proposed it was the intention of the projectors to have the issue of the regular size, eight pages, six columns, and they modestly feared that they would have difficulty getting reading matter and advertisements to fill that space.

The paper has grown on their hands. Soon after the advertising solicitors had begun their canvass it was seen that the paper would have to be enlarged. The first thought was to increase it to twelve pages, but better judgment said increase it to sixteen. This was done. Still the ads kept rolling in. The local merchants had been pretty well canvassed and the quantity of space they would take ascertained, but the outside merchants, in Detroit and other cities, kept sending in their orders for space till it was found necessary yesterday to increase the size of the paper to twenty pages. This will make the woman's edition the largest paper THE MINING JOURNAL has ever gotten out. The original order for papers was at the same time increased five hundred.

Young lady canvassers are now going over the city soliciting orders for the paper, and so great is the interest the scheme has excited that they scarcely meet with a refusal. The private orders, not advertisers copies, run all the way from a hundred down. Over \$100 worth of papers were subscribed for yesterday. One of the heaviest customers the ladies have is the Business Men's association, which has taken a page ad and ordered 200 copies of the paper for distribution where they will do good work advertising the talents of Marquette ladies and so booming the town as a desirable place of residence.

The labor of getting out a paper of this size is great. It is more than could be done in one night with a force several times that of THE MINING JOURNAL. To overcome this difficulty copy for ads and special articles is now being put in type, the day force being pressed into service as well as the regular news compositors, but all the local and telegraphic news matter will be set the night before the issue, as is customary. Buyers of the woman's edition need have no fear of getting a stale paper.

One place where a good deal of extra work falls, and one seldom thought of by the general public, is the circulation department. While practically every local subscriber of the paper will buy a copy of the New Year's issue, many of these will have extra copies, five, ten or twenty, and still others who are not on the regular carrier list will place their orders, and expect the papers delivered to them in the morning the same as the regular subscribers. This necessitates new carrier lists being made out and the routes in part made over, which is no light task. New Year's morning the carriers will have their share of extra work. That the lists may be made out properly and the routes arranged so as to avoid confusion, and to insure a fairly prompt delivery, the ladies desire to have every subscription in at the earliest moment.

**Closed on a Mortgage.**  
Many people were surprised yesterday morning to go down town and find that Grabower's big dry goods store had its door locked and curtains drawn.

It had been closed by a creditor, the largest of eight, to whom chattel mortgages were given a week ago. The eight mortgages aggregate nearly \$18,000 and cover the stocks in both the Marquette and Baraga stores. The store really closed Saturday night, but as it was not shut till the evening was half over, the suspension did not become generally known till yesterday.

When the mortgages were given last week Mr. Grabower expected to continue in business without even a suspension, but affairs took an unexpected turn, and the foreclosure was the result. The troubles of the firm are of recent origin. It has always enjoyed good credit, and had the reputation of meeting its bills promptly. The probabilities are that the embarrassment will be only temporary, and arrangements made which will allow Mr. Grabower to continue his business.

**Thinks Drivers Are Careless.**  
"You ought to write up these careless drivers here," said a well known Marquette man yesterday to a reporter for THE MINING JOURNAL.  
"There's too much driving by half grown boys who don't take any care what they are doing, where they are going, or whether they are going to run over anybody, or what they are going to do. It's a wonder people don't get hurt every day."

"I saw a man come just as near getting run over at the corner of Front and Washington as could be the other day. A horse and wagon came down Washington street full speed, never slackened at all and turned down Front street. This man was standing with his back to the horse, just on the edge of the crossing. He'd have been punched right through the back by the pill, but a man reached out and jerked him back just in time.  
"Only a few days up by St. Paul's church I saw two children have a narrow escape. They were crossing the street, and a horse and delivery wagon came by at full tilt. Two men grabbed them and pulled them one each way and just got them out from in front of the horse."  
"And I saw an old woman come

pretty near being run over by a sleigh here," chimed in the office associate of the first speaker. "She was right by Fendill's corner. I guess the horse had got a little the best of the fellow who was driving, for he didn't seem to be able to hold him. The horse didn't have any bells, and the sleigh slipped up on her so quiet that she came within an ace of being knocked down and run over."

"I think there is an ordinance requiring bells with every sleigh. If there is it ought to be enforced, because the sleighs run so still that it is dangerous to go on crossings were a team may come around the corner."

He said he would meet Blue, if the latter desired, the next night after, or two or three nights after he met Williams. In all events the match must be brought off before the tenth, as Mr. Dwyer expects to leave for Toledo then.

The only original Santa Claus, the one who has appeared every year for something over thirteen centuries to gladden the hearts of children, was on hand last evening at Morgan Memorial chapel to assist the Sunday school children to their share of the Christmas good cheer.

Previous to the distribution of gifts a special service was held in the church. The children and their parents then adjourned to the chapel, where a prettily decorated tree was set up to bear the gifts for the little folks. Bishop Williams spoke a few words announcing the coming of Santa, and then the jingle of bells was heard in the distance. In a moment the door was opened and the jolly old saint clad in the costume of the Marquette Snowshoe club entered the room.

He began the distribution of presents without delay, and soon the children were happy in the possession of nuts and candy and small gifts.

**Honor Their Chief.**  
St. Agnes court No. 70, of the Woman's Catholic Order of Foresters, held a farewell supper last night in Greninger's hall on Washington street, for Mrs. Mary Barth, late chief ranger, who leaves tomorrow for Stevenson, Mich.

The fifty members of the lodge sat down at three tables that groined under the load of good things they carried. During the supper Mrs. Barth was presented by Mrs. Loretta Stafford, chief ranger, with a beautiful gold pin, a gift from the lodge. The pin was in the form of a bar and shield. It was engraved with the letters "W. C. O. F." and with the words, "Presented by St. Agnes court No. 70, Dec. 28."
