

The adopted emergency ration will weigh a trifle over 30 ounces and will provide food and drink for a soldier for five days, or, in times of direst emergency, for ten days. A by no means unimportant provision is that the new ration includes a portion of tobacco, suggested by the liberal-minded experts as a solace to the soldier. The ration is as follows: Hard bread, 16 ounces; bacon, ten ounces; pea meal, four ounces; coffee, with four grains of saccharin, two ounces; salt, 64-100 of an ounce; pepper, 4-100 of an ounce;

MANY STILL SPEAK GAELIC. By No Means an Extinct Lauguage in Spite of Its Position Here.

A new appointment has been made from Waterford to the chair of professor of Gaelic in Maynooth college, Ireland. The new appointee is a member of the Gaelic league of Dublin, and was the first editor of the Archaeological Journal, of Waterford. The opinion is very general that Gaelic is an extinct language, or one nearly ex- J. H. LA ROCHELLE Millinery, Notinct, and the labors of the Gaelic society in New York to revive its use have lent some color to that opinion. Nevertheless, as figures show, the Gaelic tongue is most tenacious, and, according to the last reports, is spoken, though not exclusively, by 1,000,000 persons in the British Isles-600,000 in Ireland, 350,000 in Wales and 220,000 in Scotland.

Though English is the official language of all these countries, the popularity of English increases slowly despite the disadvantage under which those who use Gaelie labor, that of having no established grammar and no recognition in an official way. Gaelic fulfills the colloquial requirements of the farmers and fishermen in the counties remote from the large cities, somev hat as the Basque language continues to be popular in the northern provinces

of Spain. In this country Gaelie has made little headway, though many patriotic Irishmen have by various methods endeavored to acquaint others less patriotic with its advantages. While the use of most European languages has about doubled in 75 years, five times as many persons speak English as did in 1820.

#### THE ERRING BURGLAR. Acquitted, He Is Found at His Old Ways Again.

A curious romance of burglary and filial affection is told in the French newspapers, says the New York Journal. It has generally been supposed to be almost impossible to escape from the French penal settlement at Cayenne, and the perils to be confronted in the forests both from animals and natives, ot to talk of starvation, appalled the onvicts to such an extent, that they sever even thought of attempting Book binder, Ruler and dight. This theory has just received a evere shock, the description of no less than 30 recently escaped convicts havag been circulated to the police by the ninister of the interior.

One or two have already been capured in France. Among these is a cerain Petitjean, who is accused of new misdeeds. Petitjean escaped from Quiana some time ago, for no other reason, he said, than to come and embrace his old mother, who lives at Bagnolet. He was arrested, but in deference to public opinion, which was impressed by is filial affection, he was set at liberty and allowed to remain in France.

A short time ago a robbery took place on the Boulevard Diderot, in Paris, and by tracing back the stolen goods four ersons were arrested They were all earrying knives, knuckledusters and revolvers, and made a most desperate fight for their liberty. Once in prison, however, they confessed they belonged to a large gang whose chief was Petitjean. Hence the latter's arrest.

#### TRAPPING TURKEYS.

The Method Usually Employed in Taking the Wild Bird

One of the methods by which wild urkeys are taken by native hunters, as described in "Hunting and Fishing in Florida," by Mr. C. B. Cory, curator of the department of ornithology in the Field Columbian museum, Chicago, certainly does little credit to the inteligence of the turkeys. A place is found where turkeys are

numerous. Corn is scattered about, and if that is eaten, more is placed in this manner for a week or two, until they become accustomed to going there for food. Then small logs are laid, forming a square box about six or eight inches in height; possibly two logs on each side, one above the other. #### TESLA IS SKEPTICAL.

Does Not Believe the X Ray Will Enable the Blind to See.

Some Interesting Facts Obtained by the Electrician from His Latest Experiments-Manufacture of Fertilizers by Electricity. A birthday party was given in honor

Electrical Review publishes an exhaustive communication from Nicola Tesla on his latest experiments with the X rays. Tesla states that the sunburn effects noted by many experimenters are not due directly to the rays or Roentgen streams, but to the ozone generated by the rays in contact with the

skin. He says: "Nitrous acid may also be responsible to a small extent. The ozone, when abundantly produced, attacks the skin and many organic substances most energetically, the action being no doubt hastened by the heat and moisture of the skin. Owing to this, I have always taken the precaution when getting impression with the rays to guard the persons by a screen made of aluminium wires, which are connected with the ground, preferably through a conienser. The radical means, however, of preventing such actions is to make impossible the access of the air to the kin while exposing, as, for instance,

The inventor has the following to say n regard to recent alleged experiments for making the blind see by means of Roentgen rays: "Is it not ruel to raise such hopes when there is o little ground for it? Mr. Yale gives not only is own estimate of the production, but that of each of nine recognized authorities, affording a valuable comparison of data. Mr. Yale has adopted as the basis of his own statistics the statistics compiled by Louis A. Garnett and the United States mint director's report as being the most correct and complete of any extended continuous statement. In

a note to his table he says: "A table made up of the separate esimate of Blake in the Tenth census, Page 380; of Raymond in the United States mining commissioners' report of 1873, Page 543, and of John J. Valentine, of Wells, Fargo & Co., added together, make a total to January 1, 1896, of \$1,-666,091,886, while that compiled by Yale from the estimates of Garnett and the United States mint reports of January 1, 1896, make a total of \$1,265,217,217. There is, therefore, only a difference in the two sets of estimates of \$874,669, which is remarkably close.

"The authorities quoted by Mr. Yale are: J. D. Whitney, J. Rossbrowne, J. Arthur Phillips, United States mining reports; W. P. Blake, R. W. Raymond, J. J. Valentine, L. A. Garnett and the United States mint reports."

#### SPANISH BULL FIGHTS.

Consul-General Bowen Reports They Are More Popular Than Ever.

Consul General H. W. Bowen, in a report to the department of state on Spanish bull fights," says that during the season-April 5 to October 20, 1896 -there were 478 bull fights in Spain. During this period 1,218 buils, valued at \$300,000, and 5,730 horses, valued at \$200,000, were killed. The number of 'matadors" was 23, and they received for their services \$221,500. The less renowned fighters received from \$300 to \$400 for each fight, while the most renowned received from \$500 to \$8,500 The famous "Guerrita" appeared in 68 fights, killing 174 bulls and received \$51,000. "Bombita" fought 43 times, killing 112 bulls and was paid \$21,000. "Mazzantini" entered the ring 29 times, killing 68 bulls and made \$21,700.


