

NEW YORK STATE DEMOCRATIC.

Parker Elected to Supreme Bench-Legislature Probably Lost to Republicans.

New York, Nov. 2.-Rain, which prevailed generally all over the state, today had the effect of keeping home a great many country voters. The result is apparent in the reduced majorities given in concededly Republican districts to Walace, Republican nominee for chief judge of the court of apeals, last year. In many districts the pluralities of a year ago were reduced nearly one-half and in a few that have been reported there is a falling off of less than 25 per cent. Conceding to Judge Parker, Democrat, a majority of 100,-000 in Greater New York, it is probable

he has won in the state. The returns for assemblymen are entirely lacking in the Greater New York districts, owing to the large number of candidates whose votes must be counted before the assembly nominees are reached, and the results here will probably not be known until tomorrow. Outside Greater New York, with thirteen districts to be heard from, dispatches to the Associated Press indicate the continuance of Republican control of the assembly, whatever may be the result in the Greater New York

districts. Later-The indications now are the Democrats will have a small majority in the state assembly. Conceding all that is claimed by the Democrats the next house will have ten Democratic majority.

Estimates made on the basis of returns received from forty-four counties out of the fifty-seven in the state, outside of Greater New York, indicate a plurality of 46,294 for Wallace.

It takes about one half of this power to operate both plants so that two MADE MEAMAN plants of the size of the water and lighting plants in use here could really be operated with these same boilers. Whenever there is a fire an extra pressure is added but it never exceeds one hundred horse power. In the case of the last fire, when the three barns were burned, a pressure equal to eighty horse power was used. This was sufficient to burst the hose in three places.

Banner Potato Yield.

Louie Corbett of this city has finished harvesting his potatoes, and when his measurements were turned in the figures footed up exactly 17,300 bushels. This does not include several hundred bushels of smaller potatoes which passed through the screen he uses to sort his stock. This is by far the largest yield Mr. Corbett has had in one year. There are a few of the local men who make a specialty of raising potatoes who have taken out from two to five thousand bushels this season, but none of them can touch Corbett's yield. Good potatoes are still sold here at fif-
