It might be inferred from the above that events are paving the way for a higher price for ore in 1898. Naturally such a prodigious demand, which means the rapid exhaustion of some of would suggest that iron mining companies are reaching the point at which they can reasonably expect a better return on their heavy investments. For most of them have seen little profit in 1897-no such profit as is conceded to a business involving so many risks and uncertainties. Another valid argument for a higher price for old-range material lies in the limitations which experience has put upon Mesaba ores as ontrollers of the market. The Mesaba range this year, hampered as to output by nothing but the unwillingness of furnacemen to use more than so much of it, sends down about 40 per cent. of the total from all ranges possibly a little less.

But there are other considerations that suggest a better price for lake ores next year. Chief of these is that the miners must be paid higher wages. Higher wages were certainly in the program, as most men in the trade made it up, a year ago, and higher wages would have come but for the set-back given to all calculations by the depressing developments in the ore trade last winter. But when the last of the cheap ore of 1897 has been shipped and the mines start on stocking for 1898, it may be expected that the long delayed and much deserved advance to the miners will come. Columbus, Nov. 7 .- Yesterday, at Toledo, Judge Parker of the Ninth circuit court decided that the returns of Center township must be certified by the Wood county board of supervisors. This elects the Republican candidate Norris. Judge Parker held that the functions of the board of elections are simply ministerial; that they must certify to the vote as they find it, without going behind the returns; that the question as to whether the provisions of the law are not complied with in having the polling booth outside the boundaries of Center township pre cinct and whether, if so, it invalidates the ballots there cast, must be decided by the courts or by the legislature itself.

The official counting in some counties will be continued this week, but no changes are expected. 

All told last year, there were 857 licenses issued, but the number that was issued prior to the opening of the season was 352, almost 175 less than were issued up to the opening of the season this year.

There is little doubt that the demand for licenses will keep up throughout the present season, so the number will equal, if not exceed, the number issued last year.

In former years the licenses fees have been considered a perquisite of the changed that. Mr. Goodman informed the mayor that to do so would cost \$500 and that in his estimation they could get a better road to Marquette if they spent the money on the new route they are seeking to obtain, but if they do so they will expect the city to co-operate with them and build the road within the city limits.
