Knights of Labor Organization.

HENRY A. HICKS OF NEW YORK CHOSEN GRAND MASTER.

Other Changes in the List of General Officers Are Also Made, and All With the Approval of the Men Who Are Now Out of It.

SURPRISE IN LAROR CIRCLES. Louisville, Nov. 12.-James S. Sovereign, who has been general master workman of the Knights of Labor the past four years or more, was this afternoon relieved of his office by the general asembly, which has been in ses-D. Murray, sion in this city since Monday last. Under ordinary conditions Mr. Sovereign's term of office would not expire until the next meeing. This, however, it is said, makes no difference with the order, whose general officers during a assembly and can be chosen and deposed at the will of the majority.

This decided change in the corps of general officers of the Knights of Labor will cause considerable astonishment in labor circles. It is said, though the change was sudden and totally unlooked for, it was done with the amicable consent of all. On good authority it is learned it was with Mr. Sovereign's most hearty approval that he steps down and out. The same holds good of the other officers who are relieved. Mr. Sovereign stated tonight he wished retirement. He wanted to rest from the labor which the office has entailed upon him.

Henry A. Hicks, general master outline the future policy of the order under his administration for several days yet. I. D. Chamberlain, worthy foreman-elect, is a newspaper man.

All business transacted at today's meeting went through in the most amicable manner possible. There was not the slightest hitch, and perfect brotherhood prevailed. In the morning session the remnant of routine business which had been left over was disposed of. The afternoon session was principally taken up with the delivery of Mr. Sovereign's annual address, which was listened to by the delegates with the greatest interest. It was greeted with much enthusiasm.

Mr. Sovereign prefaced his address with the statement that the opening of the regular session of the general assembly presents to the world "the same undismayed membership whose fortitude and courage and spirit of progress combats greed and avarice and defies the cant and hypocrisy of the age." The order, he said, was today stronger in membership, stronger in character and stronger in the hearts of the people than it was a year ago.

He recommended this session to confine its deliberations largely to work of organization, and to this end plans should be put in operation which will insure the service of the largest possible number of experienced and efficient fields. The work of wholesale reform in the labor field, he contended, is retarder through the coercion and corruption of the poor by the holders of idle capital, who dominate the press and debauch the politics of the country, while the courts apply an arrogant lash of despotism, in the form of injunction, against freedom of speech and peaceable assemblage of the poor.

AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO THE BURIAL AND REMOVAL OF THE DEAD.

The City of Marquette Ordains: Section. 1. No remains of any person whose death occurred elsewhere than in this city shall be buried, interred or otherwise disposed of at any place within this city, nor shall any corpse of any deceased person be removed from its interment in this city, unless move any such corpse unless such per-

mit therefor shall have been issued. Sec. 2. In case the corpse of any person, whose death occurred elsewhere than in the city, shall be brought into the city, it shall be the duty of the person having charge thereof to forthwith file or cause to be filed with the recorder an affidavit stating to the best of the knowledge, information and belief of the affidavit, the name, age, sex, nativity and color of such deceased person; the date and place of death and the name and character of the disease or circumstances causing the death of such deceased person: Provided, that the making and filing of such affidavit shall not be required in case there be filed with the recorder a permit for the removal of such corpse issued in pursuance of law, by the proper officer of any city, village or LATEST township in this state in which said

deceased person died. Sec. 3. Upon the filing of such affidavit or removal permit with him the recorder shall issue a permit for the burial or other disposition of such remains. Upon the filing with him of any written application for a permit for the removal of any human corpse from its place of burial, endorsed or accompanied with the written advice and consent of the health officer thereto, the recorder shall issue a permit for the removal of such corpse from its place of interment. The recorder shall keep a record of all such burial and removal permits issued by him.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of every such, having in charge the interment of the remains of any person who died elsewhere than in this city, or the removal of any corpse from its place of sexton, surerintendent or other person in charge of the cemetery wherein such interment is to take place or from which such removal is to be made, a the case may be, from the recorder, before any such interment or removal.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of each of the sextons, superintendents and persons in charge of any cemetery in the city to keep or cause to be kept a register of all persons buried in such cemetery, or removal therefrom, showing the name of the deceased person, the number of the lot or location in which the body was buried and the date of burial and removal; a true copy of which shall be certified to each week by the sexton, superintendent or patent medicines for throat and lung other person in charge of such cemetery, and shall be filed with the re-

Sec. 6. Any violation of or failure to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars and com rtment sleeping cars. 


