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NO SPECIAL SESSION WANTED.

We very much doubt that Governor Pingree has ever had in serious contemplation calling the legislature together in extra session, though he has intimated at different times that he might do this in order that action might be taken on some railroad bills, which the legislature neglected or refused to pass when in regular session, with a better knowledge of what its constitutional powers are owing to the decision of the supreme court in the mileage book matter.

Everybody who understands the composition of the present legislature knows that it would be very unlikely to enact any of the measures which Governor Pingree desires to have passed, even with its right to do this affirmed by the decision of the supreme court. As a matter of fact, that decision merely settled that the legislature has the constitutional right to do some things which a majority of its members at the session last winter assumed to believe it had no legal authority to do.

Popular sentiment is almost solidly against having an extra session of the legislature held, and the governor will make a mistake if he insists on calling it. If the people really want the legislation that he desires to have enacted for further regulation of the railroads they can next year elect a legislature favorable to it, and in the meantime they are not suffering greatly from the alleged exactions of the roads.

Bishop William Crowell Doane of Albany is apprehensive that if the people of the United States do not drop their habit of regarding England as an unfriendly nation there is danger that we may some day become involved in war with that country, and it is evident, from the tenor of his address on the subject to the clergy of his diocese, just given out, that the good bishop is of the opinion that we would come out badly whipped if we should get into a row with England.

It is decidedly refreshing to see the pretensions of the swelled prophet of the Soonomas as mercilessly punctured as they are by the little tri-weekly contemporary of that so-called sheet, the Soom Times. The Times isn't as large as some of 'em, but it is as full of pluck and pizen as the editor of the almanac it attacks so courageously is as of vanity—which is putting it quite strongly.
