

MORE LIBERAL THAN THAT OF MANY OF OUR STATES.

LEGISLATURE WILL HAVE FULL LAW-MAKING POWER.

Right of Approval Vested in Governor General Holds in Only Three Cases No Property Qualifications as to Electors: One Man, One Vote.

IS TO BE APPLIED IMMEDIATELY Washington, Nov. 29.-Spanish minister De Lome has received long dispatches from Madrid showing in detail An Interesting Suit to Recover Money Now the pian of autonomy which Spain is about to apply to Cuba. While these do the minister said today:

"I regret that so much misapprehension has arisen over the new law, owing to the meagre reports heretofore received concerning it. I must admit, also, I have been astonished at the disposition in some quarters to criticise small technical features without looking at the broad general character of the new reform law. It is a measure which will stand the closest inspection, and I am very desirous that the American people should look into it with care, studying it and comparing it with other constitutional methods governing colonies. ple of this country, outside of those irreconciliables who are always to be met

the old plan, with some change in detail. As a matter of fact the new plan is the complete realization of the policy and platforms of the Autonomist party during the last twenty years. The old plan in making laws, but merely advised as to those laws.

"Now, however, the new law proposes to give the Cuban parllamentary body full law-making power. The completeness of this legislative power is as great, if not greater, than that enjoyed by Canada or by any state in the United States. This is readily demonstrated by comparing the plan of the new law with that of the British North American act of 1867, which established the present formerly aide-de-camp to the viceroy of parliamentary system of Canada.

"In the new plan for Cuba there is no property qualifications as to electors. It Royal West regiment. is one man, one vote, the same whether he be black or white. If the new law is compared with the systems prevailing in the several states of the United States it will be found that Cuba is to have a far greater measure of control of her own affairs than do several of the states of this country. For instance, she is given control of her posta! affairs, control of her banking and currency, control over her customs. When it was suggested that among certain classes no plan of autonomy was acceptable, the Spanish minister said:

"Certainly; there are irreconciliables on both sides-Spanish irreconcillables and Cuba irreconciliables-but they are not the ones to be considered. It is the people at large and the material interests of Cuba that are to be considered The Cubangirreconcillable says he wil not accept this new law. He does not point out its defects, or suggest remedies. He simply declines to accept it Such men are out of court, they are not open to argument or reason.

There is another feature which should be noted. For the first time the government has said officially that Spain will assume part of the debt o Cuba. The payment of this debt is to be arranged by cortes, but this will be on a basis satisfactory to both parties.

Recurring to the legislative power: which Cuba would enjoy, the ministe was asked if this was not qualified t some extent by the right of approval re served to the governor general in certain cases.

"It will be found on examining the new law," answered Senor De Lome "that the governor general has this reserved right only in three specific cases while the general rule is that the laws go into effect without reserve. Furthermore, these three reservations are the same as those given to the governorgeneral of Canada or any other colonial ex-

PRESIDENT'S EAR IS DEAF TO ALL ARGUMENTS.

DECLINES TO STAND SPONSOR TO GOLD BONDS.

Neither Does He Approve Retirement of Greenbacks, Which Are the Two Main Features of the Treasury Man's Plan

-Forecast of Message.

REFUSES EXECUTIVE ENDORSEMENT. Washington, Nov 29.-Those who have pinned their faith in currency reform to the plan laid down by Secretary Gage will be disappointed, for in his message, as it now stands, the president has failed to approve it in any essential particular. This fact is confirmed by a prominent official of the treasury department, who said:

'The president approves neither the gold bonds nor the retirement of the greenbacks. His message will urge that the greenbacks redeemed in gold be held in trust and not paid out except for gold. He will also approve permitting national banks to issue notes up to the par value of their bonds deposited as security. Beyond that the president has not and will not go. There will not be a word of approval of the retirement of the greenbacks for the simple reason that on this point the president does not agree with his secretary of the treasury. The best Mr. Gage has been able to secure is the assurance that the president will not directly antagonize either the gold bonds or the retirement of the greenbacks."

The main feature of Mr. Gage's cheme is a proposed issue of bonds payable specifically in "gold" instead of coin" as provided for by existing law. The secretary proposed to take up the greenbacks gradually, and also refund the existing bearing debt. He showed that the saving of interest would ultimately be sufficient to provide for the cost of retiring the greenbacks. The secretary of the treasury was firmly convinced that there would be no difficulty in floating bonds at not to exceed 21/2 per cent. provided that they were made payable in gold, so that holders of these securities could be relieved of all fear of having their securities paid ultimately in depreciated silver dollars.

This gold bond was necessarily the gregate more than \$165,000,000. foundation stone of the secretary's plan, for he expected the bonds to be eagerly taken by the national banks as the basis of their circulation. DEFICIT KEEPS ROLLING UP.

Dingley Law Failing to Bring in the Revenues Anticipated.

Washington, Nov. 29.-There are fears in some official quarters here that unless the receipts under the Dingley bill increase enormously during the next few months there will have to be additional revenue legislation or a bond issue will have to be resorted to before the first of next October in order to provide money for the ordinary expenses of the government.

But, on the other hand, it is explained the reduced revenues are no more than what was expected, considering the great rush of imports before the Dingley bill became a law of the land in order to escape the increased taxation. It is also pointed out that the stocks in importers' hands, although immense, have been greatly reduced by the returning better times, and that a great influx of goods from abroad is soon to be expected.

However that may be, it is a fact, nevertheless that the average daily reeipts under the Dingley bill for the first five months were \$850,000. as compared with \$950,000 under the Wilson bill for the same period. The expenditures under the Dingley bill were \$1,150,000 per day, as compared with \$1,000,000 under the Wilson law. These figures show a difference of \$250,-000 per day in favor of the Wilson tariff.

The forthcoming November statement of the government receipts and expenditures will show that the receipts have so far reached \$22,951,000, which indicates a total of about \$25,000,000 for the month. This is a trifling improvement over October, when the receipts were \$24,391,000. The deficit thus far during November stands at \$8,572,000, which is larger than expected. The deficit for the fiscal year stands at \$46,581,000, the receipts having been \$127,701,000 and the expenditures \$174,282,280. The receipts from customs so far this

fiscal year undoubtedly will fall considerably short of the estimates made by the managers of the new tariff bill during its pendency in congress. At that time it was estimated the customs would yield \$180,000,000 during the first year. The indications now are that the receipts from this source will not ag-




