



> The cost of the armies of the different powers varies very widely. Russia leads the line with an annual expenditure of \$154.500,000, and Germany comes next with \$135,000,000. France is a close third with \$130,000,000. These are the only powers whose land forces cost over \$100,-000.000 a year. Great Britain ranks fourth with \$90,000,000, and Austria fifth with \$86,500,000. Italy brings up the rear with \$53,450,000, a charge which, though only about one-third as large as that sustained by Russia, is undoubtedly harder to bear than the war load laid upon the broader shoulders of the Muscovite people. The figures we have given foot up \$649,450,000. That is a tremendous burden, falling as it does, in the main, upon countries where the margin between the earnings of labor and the cost of a bare living is cut on a very narrow scale, and, indeed, is too often quite invisible.

Greater in Volume, as Indicated by Bank Clearings, Than Ever Known for That Month.

FAILURES, TOO, THE SMALLEST IN THE COUNTRY'S HISTORY.

IRON IMPROVEMENT CONTINUES AND IS MOST NOTABLE.

No Room for Doubt That the Wheat Crop Will Be the Largest Ever Harvested, but That of Corn No More Than for Home Consumption

AS REVIEWED BY R. G. DUN & CO. New York, Sept. 2.-R. G. Dun & Co.'s Trade Review for this week tomorrow

"The smallest failures ever recorded in any month for five years were those of August. No other month since the monthy reports were commenced by Dun's Review has shown defaulted Habilitles as small.

"The bank clearings have been the largest ever known in August, 23 per cent. larger than in 1892. This enormous volume of business in a month usually one of the most inactive of the year demands attention. The postponement during the months of the war of some contracts and purchases, which now come forward, explains part of the increase, and the absorption of securities explains part; but there has also been a great decline in the average prices of all commodities.

"There is no room to doubt that the wheat crop, even though it may fall a shade below the estimates, will prove the largest ever harvested. Foreign buying this week has been strong. The Atlantic exports for the week have been 3,326,878 bushels, against 5,534,800 in the same week of last year, and Pacific exports 459,000 bushels, against 258,650 last year. But the receipts at the West are increasing, and the price has dropped 5 cents for spot. Corn has fallen a fraction, later reports indicating a less satisfactory yield and probably not more than should be consumed at home, in view of the enlarging stock of animals.

"The improvement in the iron industry has not only continued, but becomes more impressive because, after the enormous buying of materials has satisfied the needs of great consumers for months to come, the demand for the products is so great that both material and produce have gradually advanced in price. 




