



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

"The Zenith City of the Unsalted Seas."

STREETS.—The retail business houses are mostly located on Superior St. The streets above this, running parallel are numbered from First up. Lake Avenue crosses Superior street and runs on Minnesota Point. The Avenues all run up the hill. and are numbered from Lake Avenue, which is the dividing line, either east or west.

PARKS.—LESTER PARK—On the banks of the beautiful Lester river, is about six miles from the business center and can be reached in 40 minutes by the Lakeside cars, going east on Superior St., which run every 20 minutes. Lincoln Park.—A charming picnic ground on the bank of Miller's Creek, at 25th Ave. W., can be reached in 15 minutes on West Duluth cars, along Superior and Third Streets. Zenith Park.—On an island in St. Louis River, can be reached by boat, or by street cars to West Duluth, and ferry from there.

THE INCLINE.—This incline railway, from foot of 7th Avenue West to the Pavilion, Palm Garden and Summer Theatre, at the tap of the hill, is something that should not be missed by any visitor to Duluth. The height attained is about 500 feet, the view is magnificent, and one long to be remembered.

THE UPPER BAY.—Passing through the new bridge connecting Duluth and Sucirior, which has a span of 491 ft., weight 1800 tons, the third heaviest draw bridge in the orld, and operated entirely by electricity, entrance is made to St. Louis Bay, where is exacted two of the largest ore docks in the world, with a capacity for loading twenty of the largest steamers at once.






