

ASSASSIN'S BLOW KILLS EMPRESS!

Life of Elizabeth of Austria Comes to a Violent End in Switzerland.

Stabbed to the Heart With a Stiletto in the Hand of an Italian Anarchist.

Murderer Is Captured and a Dozen of His Associates Are Also Under Arrest.

Whither Her Majesty Had Traveled Incog.

Worst Is Feared at Vienna from the Effects of the Deep Shock on Franz Josef.

WAS MOST FOULLY STRUCK DOWN.

Geneva, Switzerland, Sept. 11.-Elizabeth, empress of Austria, was assassinated at the Hotel Beaurivage Saturday af-The murderous assailant stabbed her majesty with a stiletto. He was a man named Luchoni, born in Paris of Italian parents. He is a professional anarchist and has been apprehended.

It appears that her majesty was walkng from her hotel to the landing place of steamer unconscious. The boat started, but as her majesty failed to regain consciousness, the captain returned and the empress was carried to the Hotel Beaurivage, where she soon expired.

The stretcher upon which the empress was carried to the hotel was hastily improvised with oars and sail cloth. Dectors and priests were immediately summoned and a telegram was sent to Emperor Franz Josef. All efforts to revive here majesty were unavailing and Red Bluff, Cal., Sept. 11.-Fire this she expired at 3 o'clock. The medical must have used a small triangular file.

After striking the blow the assassin ran along the Rue des Alpes, with the evident intention of entering the Place de Alpes, but before reaching it he was selzed by two cabmen who had witnessed the rime. They handed him over to a boatman and a gendarme, who conveyed him to the police station. The prisoner made no resistance; he even sang as he walked along saying: "I did it, and she must be dead." At the police station he declared that he was a "starving anarchist, with no hatred for the poor, but only for

That is a good way, but the horses and mules taken to Cuba had been kept standing ten days in the close holds of the transports, and about one in five of those who escaped death en route went to the bottom like lead when they struck the water. Their legs were stiff. A better way would have been to land them in lighters, as did General Miles in Porto Rico, who differs from General Shafter as much as a Kentucky thoraughbred differs from a Mexican broncho. And there were not a thousand head landed in Cuba, either. There were less than 500."

The empress of Austria was born Dec. 24, 1837. She was a daughter of Duke Maximilian of Bavaria, and was married to Francis Joseph, emperor of Austria and king of Hungary, April 24, 1854. "I have just concluded and signed a treaty of peace with England, and this negotiation has left in my mind a painful sentiment. We have recognized the independence of the English colonies, and that is to me a subject of grief and of dread. 


