DAGGER PENETRATED HEART.

ELIZABETH'S ASSASSIN DID IT AS WARNING TO "OPPRESSORS."

Geneva, Switzerland, Sept. 12 .- The **CONFRONTS DEWEY!** post-mortem examination of the remains of Empress Elizabeth of Austria has revealed the fact that the assassin's dagger penetrated the heart.

By order of the magistrate the assassin was taken this afternoon from the Saint Anthony prison to the Anthropometrical Institute, where he was measured and photographed.

In the course of his examination, he said he had never known his father or mother. He was brought up at Parma, Italy, in a charity school. At the age of ten he was thrown on the streets without resources. He worked as a laborer until twenty. Then he served in the Italian army for three years and a half. On leaving his regiment he was employed as a valet de chambre of the Prince of Aragon for three months. At this time anarchist ideas began to possess his mind.

In the prison the assassin boasted of his crime. He said he was not impelled by misery to kill the empress, but had mmitted the deed that such crimes night cause all who impoverish the poplace to tremble and shiver.
