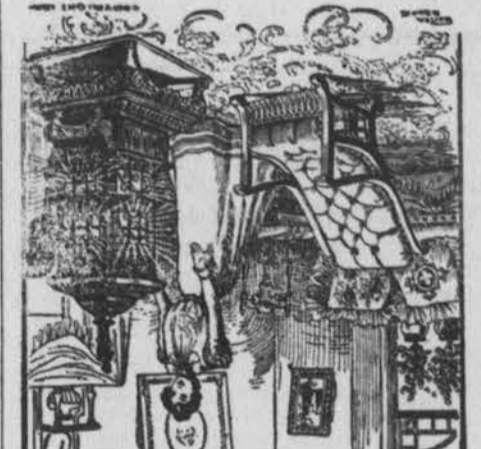

CHEERS FOR JOHN JONES.

GREAT HONOR DONE THE OLD STALWART AT THE STATE CONVENTION IN DETROIT.

The following relative to the seating of the Sheldon delegates from Marquette county in the Republican state convention at Detroit Wednesday, appeared in Thursday's Free Press:

"It was 5:15 o'clock when Chairman Grosvenor announced that the committee on credentials, which had been in session since noon, was ready to report. The announcement was received with manifestations of approval by the waiting delegates. Wm. F. Petrie immediately came forward and began reading the committee's report. He said that all the counties in the state were represented, except Keweenaw. He announced, as was expected, that there had been a contest over the Marquette county delegation. The Sheldon faction desired to seat its delegates and the Stephenson faction wished likewise. Ex-Judge Hatch had represented the Sheldon faction before the committee and Byron S. Waite the Stephenson faction.

"There was general applause from all parts of the convention hall when Mr. Petrie declared that the committee on credentials had decided to seat M. M. Duncanson, Gad Smith and others, who were known to be members of the Sheldon faction delegation.

"The report brought on the first fight of the convention. F. A. Blades of Detroit moved an amendment that the report be adopted, except that part referring to Marquette, and announced that after that had been adopted he would move the debate be limited to twenty minutes on each side. It was evident that this amendment had no chance of being carried, from the murmurs of dissent heard throughout the hall, and when the chairman put the question there was an overwhelming chorus of 'noes.' Then Byron S. Waite arose with another amendment, which was that the Stephenson delegation be seated.

"Mr. Waite spoke at some length, urging that the Stephenson delegation be seated in the interest of harmony, but at the conclusion of his remarks changed his amendment to read that each of the opposing parties from Marquette should be given half the delegation from that county.

"Judge Hatch then obtained the floor and strongly attacked Mr. Waite's amendment. He said that the question underlying the controversy between the Marquette delegations was the congressional contest in the Twelfth district.

"The convention was very impatient for a vote and interruptions of the speaker were frequent, so that the judge cut short his remarks. The chairman then called for a vote on Mr. Waite's amendment, and this was defeated by an overwhelming majority. When the original question was put, that the committee's

report be adopted, the vote in the affirmative was almost unanimous, only a few voices being heard to say no, thus showing the strong sympathy of the convention with Sheldon. When the delegation recommended by the committee on credentials entered the hall a few moments later, it was loudly cheered on all sides. A delegate from the Twelfth district rose and caused considerable amusement by proposing: 'Three cheers for John Jones, the governor of northern Michigan.' The cheers were given by about thirty delegates sitting at the front. Jones is one of Sheldon's principal backers in his fight for the congressional nomination in the Twelfth district against Sam Stephenson."

THE ROPES LOOKING WELL.

ENCOURAGING PROSPECT THAT OUTSIDE PARTIES WILL TAKE HOLD OF AND OPERATE IT.

Since testing the quartz vein in the seventh level of the Ropes gold mine was begun a few weeks ago, with a view to ascertaining if the rock found in the fifth level exists in that part of the mine, much interest in the property has been manifested by the people of Ishpeming, and especially the business men, several of whom held stock in the mine from time to time.

The exploration has been carried on in a small way under the direction of Captain Thomas Robbins, who had charge of the underground work at the mine for some time prior to the suspension of operations there a little over a year ago. The predictions of the captain when the exploratory work with a view to taking hold of the mine in case it turned out all right were that an extension of the gold bearing quartz found in the fifth level would surely be located two levels below.

The captain was in the city yesterday. Talking with the reporter about the mine, he said that the vein has been followed on the seventh level and that the rock thus far taken out is richer than that obtained in the fifth level. He said the Detroit men would be satisfied if the quartz would assay \$5 to the ton, but in his opinion it would average much better than that. He thought it would possibly run to \$8 per ton, though the average width of the vein from the time the start was made up to the present time is about six feet. This is quite a good-sized vein and it is the belief of the captain that the Detroit men should be well pleased with the showing, both as to the richness of the quartz and the size of the vein.

None of the quartz taken out has been treated at the mill. In fact the mill has not been operated since the mine closed down, though samples of the quartz have been tested, so that a result has been obtained. Inasmuch as the exploration is quite satisfactory, it is assumed that something in the way of mining operations will soon be commenced. The attention of the parties interested will doubtless

DID NOT REMAIN IN MEXICO.

Charles Kilstrom, second son of P. A. Kilstrom, got back yesterday from Mexico, where he spent nearly a year. He was down at San Pedro, where a number of miners from the Lake Superior district got places less than two years ago. Several men went from the Mesaba range, but all of them have either returned there or have gone to some other point. Andrew and John Anderson, two men who spent the greater part of their lives in Ishpeming, and who were with the Mesaba range men, have gone to California, where they engaged in the bakery business. After leaving Mexico Kilstrom went west and saw the Anderson boys and he reports that they are doing very well. The miners from this section were very well pleased with their work and their pay was satisfactory in Mexico, but the country was too tough for them.

THE FINEST SLEEPER.

The finest sleeping car that ever came to Ishpeming was here yesterday. It was a Wagner and it came in on the Chicago & Northwestern line, it being the additional one put on for the accommodation of the extra traffic. The car is what is known as the "wide vestibule." It is the latest improved sleeper and there are not many of them in use just now. These sleepers are not used much on any of the Northwestern company's routes except lines where through trains are run. They can be found on the through trains between Chicago and St. Paul, also between

tween Chicago and Denver. It is not likely the car will come up here again as the company cannot spare it for use up this way. It was taken out on the first trip because there was not another sleeper handy when the demand for an extra car was made.
