



PARIS'S PROFESSIONAL TRUNK PACKERS.

It would be interesting to many travelers returning from Europe to learn that evidence of an expert packer's work on the luggage was to be viewed as a supicious circumstance. Probably seven out of ten women who stop in Paris on their way back to this country submit their trunks to the care of the professional packers in Paris, who are to be engaged for a small sum to ac complish more toward the safe disposition of women's clothes than the most experienced amateurs can hope to do. These men are supplied chiefly from one large trunk establishment, and are to be had at all of the principal hotels. Their services cost very little. Their efforts result in great economy of space and they are able to do much toward insuring protection from the damage to trunks that may result on ocean steamers. A number of these men have been settled for some years in London, where they perform the same useful services for returning American travelers. They have never been regarded heretofore as accessories in any attempt to defraud the United States government. The men sent to London find employment there chiefly through the desire of Americans to wear their Paris clothes there, not with the idea of putting them well within the clauses of the revenue laws, but to be a part of the scene so familiar to guests at London hotels.
