Copper Country Department

ARCADIAN JOINS THE LIST.
PRODUCTION STARTS AT THIS "STANDARD OIL" PROPERTY.

Yesterday, the last day of July, marked the advent of another mining property—the Arcadian—to the list of producers of Lake copper. Production commenced in the morning from Nos. 2 and 3 shafts, the latter being a new one started from surface by the present company.

The amount of work accomplished the last few weeks in getting the shaft-houses and mill machinery in readiness can scarcely be appreciated, but it was only in line with the indomitable pluck and energy displayed by the management ever since the financial and business world was started by an announcement that the Standard Oil company had secured the property and engaged in the business of copper mining.

The Arcadian has furnished a lesson to the mining world, and it is extremely doubtful if its record of operations for the year just closed will ever again be equaled. The gentleman justly entitled to infinite credit and the greatest thanks from the local community for this most successful accomplishment is Nathan F. Leopold of Chicago, who really has done more to advance the interests of the copper district than any one who ever set foot within its confines.

The mineral lands of the Arcadian comprise 5,229 acres, and include the old Arcadian, Douglas, Edwards, Concord, St. Mary's and Highland properties. The most westerly lode on the property is the Calumet & Hecla conglomerate, and east of this belt, in the order named, are the Osceola amygdaloid, North Star conglomerate, Kearsarge conglomerate, Kearsarge amygdaloid, Grand Portage amygdaloid, and the Isle Royale amygdaloid, which latter is the belt upon which mining operations are now conducted.

Now that the mill is in operation the development of the mine will be conducted, if anything, with greater dispatch than has marked the wonderful degree of operations during the past year. The present shafts reach but a small portion of the company's big mineral tract, and the time will surely arrive, and that at no great distant date, when the Arcadian will be producing from fully a dozen big shafts. It will not be surprising if the Arcadian begins the development of the Kearsarge lode within the next few months.

The mill building is a steel structure, 132 by 213 feet. The rock bins are also of steel, while the railroad trestles leading to the mill are of like material. The mill within a few months will contain three stamps that will have a combined capacity of 1,500 tons daily. One hundred and eight of the latest improved Jigs have been installed and also nine double-decked Fraser & Chalmers slime tables. The boiler house, also of steel and corrugated iron, contains four 84-inch crown tube boilers, run at 110-pound pressure, to operate stamps, and one 72-inch crown tube boiler, run at 150 pounds pressure, to operate pumping engines. The pump house likewise is of steel and corrugated iron, and contains a triple expansion, high duty pumping engine. Its capacity is 15,000,000 gallons every twenty-four hours, a quantity sufficient for six heads of stamps, which, by the way, will be in operation a year hence, possibly earlier.

The mine equipment has been procured with a distinct view of securing the best service and economy in every possible direction. In this respect it is believed that the management has been highly successful. Money has not been spared to accomplish the purpose, and in many quarters it is believed that the Arcadian will mine and mill every ton of rock as cheap as any amygdaloid producer on the Lake. And if this is accomplished no greater tribute could be paid those who have labored so incessantly during the past twelve months.

ARRANGEMENTS UNDER WAY.

FIREMEN FORMULATE PLANS FOR ATTENDING THE TOURNAMENT AT MARQUETTE.

The members of the fire department held a meeting at their headquarters Saturday night to decide on arrangements for attending the coming tournament at Marquette. Committees were appointed to look after the details and they will attend to their appointed work within the next few days.

A quorum of firemen was present and they decided to attend the tournament in style. A committee was appointed to secure a band which will escort the local department in the parade and help with the musical program during the remainder of the tournament. The Ishpeming City band will probably be engaged. Delegates were appointed to attend the annual convention, which meets Wednesday, the first day of the tournament. Chief J. S. Mennie and Henry Routhier were selected. Herman Jaedeeke and Mike Cashen were appointed alternates.

A committee was appointed to look after railroad fares and meal tickets for the members of the department attending the meeting. It will draw on the treasurer and relieve the individual members from any and all annoyance on that score. Special trains will be run for the up-the-road departments on tournament days. Wednesday the local department will go down to Marquette on the noon train, reaching that city in time to participate in the afternoon parade, which is the only formal part of the first day's program. There will be a special train returning which will leave Marquette at 6 o'clock to bring the firemen home. It will reach here in time to enable them to attend the evening performance of Ringling's circus.

Many will want to take in this attraction and the 6 o'clock special will be put on for their benefit. On Thursday and Friday the local department will leave for Marquette on a special, starting at 8 o'clock in the morning. The returning special will leave the Queen City at 3 p. m. Those who desire to spend the evening at Marquette can return on the regular 10:45 or stay in the city over night. This will be optional with all but the members of the running team, who will be expected to return on the special.

The firemen will attend the tournament in style and with every convenience that will conduce to their comfort. The turnout of the local department will probably be the largest at the Queen City, and with a good band as an escort its appearance should be most creditable to the department and the city. The special train which will carry the firemen will also accommodate many others from here who will go to Marquette. It will get local people to Marquette before the program is started in the morning and will return them to this city in time for a good night's rest, and will be

a very convenient train for that reason. Irrespective of accommodations, the attendance from this city on the two last days of the tournament will be unexampled. Merchants here complain that this month's business is not as good as it should be and they attribute this to the fact that the people are holding part of their money in anticipation of circus day and the much greater occasion of the Fifth Annual Firemen's tournament. Interest in the nightly work of the track team is on the increase, as its members are rounding into form, and the evening assemblage at the track is very large.

They have done this. When all accounts are settled there will be a small surplus in favor of the local choir. This speaks well for the committees in charge, as the expenses were quite heavy. This happy condition of affairs is largely due to the fine attendance at the concert Saturday night. The number that turned out was very gratifying to the singers. It was much the largest gathering that ever assembled in the auditorium of the school at a fifty cent admission price. The program offered was worthy of the large attendance and all who were there got full value for their money.
