WAS IT A SUCCESS?

With the closing of the peace congress at The Hague opinions will differ as to its effect upon the military spirit of the age. Men who eat a great deal of beef, indulge with more or less freedom in beverages of a stimulating nature, and who are gifted with belligerent attributes of both body and mind, will argue that the peace conference was a failure.

Men who do not belong to either extreme will see in the work at The Hague much of value in point of influence and ultimate effect, and little of immediate concern to the international affairs of the world. It is only fair to say that little of a utilitarian character was expected at the outset, and that more has been accomplished than was predicted by those who doubted the wisdom of the movement.

That general agreements were reached looking to the arbitration of international difficulties, and placing limitations upon war, must be regarded as a long step in the direction of universal peace. The conference report will doubtless lead up to a clearer and better understanding of that vague proposition now known as "the law of nations," which is no law at all.

If the peace congress has done nothing more than to lay the foundations for a more complete understanding as to what rights shall or shall not be exercised in war, it has accomplished a great deal of mankind. The advocates of peace have a right to congratulate themselves on the fact that the representatives of rival nations could meet on a common footing and agree upon certain recommendations that will, if carried out, result to the general benefit of the world, pointing to the growth of the peace sentiment and making that end a final possibility.

ALGER'S SENATORIAL CANDIDACY.

The Detroit papers are doing a good deal of speculating concerning the candidacy of General Alger for the senatorial seat now filled by Senator McMillan. The prevailing belief among them is that Alger will drop out of the contest and that McMillan will be chosen to succeed himself without much of a struggle.

If this should happen an element of much trouble for the Republicans of Michigan in the next campaign would be eliminated. A contest between Alger and McMillan over the senatorship would greatly distract the party in the state, and might become so bitter as to give the opposition control of the legislature. For this reason all who desire continuance of the supremacy of the Republican party in the state will hope that Alger may decide not to be a candidate, and thus avert all possibility of disaster to the party.

One thing will operate powerfully to make Alger hesitate about giving McMillan a clear field for the senatorial succession. It has been charged by Alger's closest friends, and not denied by McMillan, that when the latter was last elected he, in gratitude to Alger for having declined to be a candidate against him, promised not to seek a third term and to throw his support to Alger for the senatorship in 1900 should he then be a candidate for it.

The iron market abroad is about as prosperous as our own. Commenting on the state of the trade in Great Britain, the Engineering and Mining Journal remarks: The British iron market is in a condition very similar to our own, with the strongest demand known for years, and the highest prices. This condition shows one essential difference between the present strong iron market and the short-lived boom of 1895. The activity now is not limited to this country, but extends practically to all the leading iron-making countries. Little relief can therefore be expected from imports or purchases from other countries, where the supplies are already well taken up.

A good deal has been said in some of the English papers about orders for steel coming from the United States. It seems, however, that they have been making much talk out of a small matter, the only basis for the comments made having been one or two orders placed abroad for steel by mills which found it impossible to get as early deliveries here as they wanted.

AUSTRALIAN OPAL MINES.

Gems Found in Large Quantities in New South Wales.

Opal mining is one of the latest Australian mineral industries, this beautiful gem being abundant in New South Wales and Queensland. In the former it furnishes employment to a considerable number of people in the Wilcannia district, in the far northwestern portion of the colony, a country rarely visited by those not having business there, and the mineral richness of which remains practically unknown, even in Sidney.

At present everything is in a most primitive state, as there has not yet been time to begin work in earnest, but negotiations are in progress which, when completed, will mean the erection of extensive plants of the most modern machinery and the employment of large numbers of men. The lodes are of great size, both in regard to length of lode and width, and the ore is rich and carries gold and silver in addition to

the copper. Immense finds of copper have been made in other parts of the district, and fresh discoveries are reported from time to time. It should be borne in mind that the greater portion of the district is virgin country. Gold has been found distributed over an area of over 200 miles in length, but the only attempt at anything like work has been made in the Mount Browne district, where twenty years ago alluvial gold was found over a large area.

Thus attracting a considerable number of men to the district, but two or three years later the Barrier silver fields were opened up, and as these were quickly provided with ample railway communication from South Australia, greater inducement was held out to the miners who left Mount Browne and went to the Silverton and Broken Hill mines, and ever since the Wilcannia district has not had the attention bestowed on it which it deserved. Had there been a railroad within anything like a reasonable distance of the country, modern machinery would have been erected and the reefs would have been developed.

An American In London.

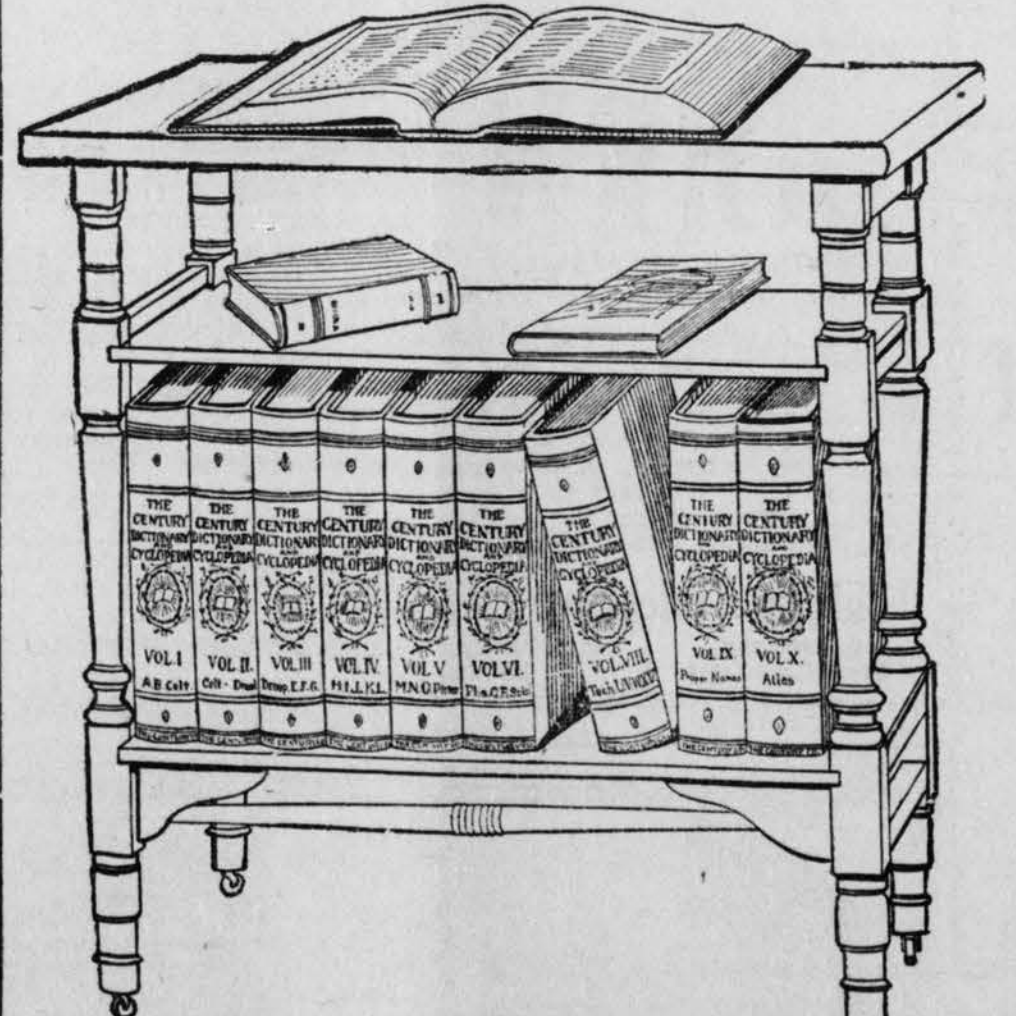

The common council met for its regular August meeting last night. President Stevens was in the chair in place of the mayor.

Recorder Donovan had several papers on his desk. Among the first was the resignation of M. H. Ford as policeman, to take effect this morning.

An invitation was next presented by Morse Hose company to the council to participate in the parade Wednesday. This invitation was accepted with the understanding that every member not also a member of the fire department would be on hand.

STANDS WITH THE COUNTY.

When the committee reports were reached Alderman Gorman presented the report of the finance committee on the Grace furnace tax matter. The report included the decision of the supervisors to demand 75 cents on the dollar and recommended that the council take the same stand.

The street and sewer committee reported favorably on a petition of James Brahney and three others for a sewer in Hewitt from Third to Fourth. The report was adopted and the sewer will be built.

NEW BICYCLE ORDINANCE.

"An ordinance regulating the use of bicycles, automobiles and similar vehicles" was introduced by Alderman Ward. The ordinance was drafted by the city attorney at the instance of the committee on ordinances. The ordinance as presented contains provisions to prohibit riding on the sidewalks in the fire limits, requiring the use of alarms and lamps and prohibiting riding down Front street hill at a greater speed than 300 feet per minute.

Upon suggestion of Alderman Tobin the bell part of the ordinance was amended so as to prohibit the use of bells more than two and a half inches in diameter. There was some discussion regarding the provision exempting children under the age of eight from the action of the ordinance. Some of the aldermen were of the opinion the juvenile riders were the most dangerous. Their opinions prevailed and this section of the ordinance was stricken out.

GET AFTER HORSEMEN.

Another ordinance was introduced by Alderman Ward to prevent parties from leaving wagons in the street, from leaving teams on the street for any long period unless they are tied or are in charge of the owner or driver, and still another provision to prevent livery stable keepers from leaving teams out in front of their barns for hours at a time as they often do.

Committee reports were next in order and the health committee reported that it was not in favor of paying \$200 a year to provide St. Luke's hospital with free electric lights in exchange for a free bed.

Alderman Jacobs moved that the report be laid on the table, and then it went.

Contrary to the usual custom the monthly budget of bills did not go through without opposition, the objection coming on an item of \$40 for help in the city treasurer's office during the month of July. The item was objected to because the city treasurer is working on commission. It was represented that the expense was incurred with the consent of the finance committee, but under the leadership of Alderman Tobin the council opposed the expenditure and as a compromise the bill was referred to the finance committee.

PRICE ON FIREBUGS.

In view of the recent ice house fires a resolution was introduced by Alderman Tobin offering in behalf of the city a reward of \$200 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the incendiary. This was passed unanimously. Mr. Tobin stated that the companies represented in the Call and White insurance agencies would also offer a reward, and quoted Mr. White as saying that the National Insurance association has a standing offer of \$1,000 reward for the arrest and conviction of any incendiary.
