



TELEGRAPH ON WHEELS.

Signal Corps System Described by Gen. A. W. Greely.

"The opening of the Spanish-Amerian war found the signal corps with its means and methods of electrical work fully determined on and accurately formulated. It had very few officers and men, all carefuly selected through promotion by merit, and a strictly limited equipment, but its officers were abreast of modern electrical inventions, and its enlisted men, skilled telegraph operators, practical electricians and It needed only money and authority to develop this skeleton into large organization, competent to build flying telegraph lines, to install telephone exchanges, to lay and operate submarine cables, and to construct and maintain electric light systems whereever and whenever the military exigencies required. The flying telegraph train had been brought to a high degree of excellence. A Curious Pine Tree That Is an Enigma

It is only recently that the attention of botanists has been called to this singular fact. Most plants we know do all they can to launch their progeny in the world as quickly as possible, and to to an animal's coat, or juicy pulp to tempt the birds to carry them away.

It is the universal rule throughout the vegetable kingdom-to which there is known but this one extraordinary exception-that every plant in order to reproduce its species is provided with interesting and ingenious means for effectually scattering its seeds. Why, then, is the mysterious pine tree at Kew Gardens the only exception to this rule? That is the question which botanists are asking each other.

Nobody has yet been able to offer a satisfactory explanation. In the exof a heavy hammer, is requisite to sectionize the cone. No ordinary conditions of temperature will make one of these cones open.

The only explanation of this mystery which has been offered with any grounds of plausibility is a remarkable puzzling for several months about this tree says that the species is perpetuated by fire. #### FIREMEN'S BIG TOURNAMENT HERE.

Date of the Celebration Arrives at Last and Enthusiasm Runs High.

CITY IS ALREADY SWARMING WITH HUNDREDS OF VISITORS.

INFLUX OF STRANGERS TODAY WILL REACH THE THOUSANDS.

Marquette, Arrayed as the Gayest of the Gay, Greets Her Guests-Full Program of the Next Three Days Many Events.

FIFTH ANNUAL TOURNAMENT BEGINS.

Today begins the fifth annual tournament of the Upper Peninsula Firemen's association, and on its opening date it premises, as it has all along, to be the most successful of any ever held. Nothing but a continuous downpour of rain will make it anything else, and even that will not hold it entirely in check.

Crowds it has already and bigger ones it is sure to get. The streets last night resembled the streets on circus day, and at 11:45 when the train arrived from the east it was increased 350 by those coming from the Soo, Munising and intermediate | Calumet is the town most prominently points. The Soo fire department was out for the big meeting in 1900 and seems among the arrivals, and is the first company to reach the city.

Today the influx will be by thousands. Word has come down from the copper country that the crowds that prosperous region will send are something simply enormous. The number is placed above 5,000. Other sections of the peninsula are outpouring people in proportion to their pouulation.

Expecting that such an event as the tournament would draw a certain set of Wednesday morningscalawags which make it their business to prey on large crowds, the mayor sent to Chicago and secured the services of two Pinkerton detectives who are well acquainted with nearly every crook in the country. They arrived last evening and for the rest of the week will make it their business to see that nobody who uses ordinary common sense in his dealings with strangers suffers loss.

#### BEAUTIFULLY DECORATED.

Marquette is dressed to greet the crowds in a way which will be at once the astonishment and delight of people from other towns. The Queen City has never before presented such a beautiful appearance. She is charming at all times and bewitching at night,

As the visitors leave the depot they will be confronted with the large, square white arch at the corner of Front and Superior streets. On the Superior street side this bears the word "Greeting" in incandescent lights. On the Front street side there is a spread eagle and shield and four stars, the stars and shield being outlined in lights. This arch, in common with all save the one in the middle of Front street, is constructed of white sheeting on a framework. Its general style of architecture is Ionic, and one cannot help but marvel at the successful imitation of marble pillars with such frail material.

In Front street about half way between Washington and Superior stands the grand arch. This is the only painted arch of the four. The arch itself is of beautiful design and the painting is most artistic. On the span is bears the words, 'Welcome Firemen" between which is a shield with helmet and nozzles painted on it. A painted eagle and shield is on each column. Not only are the letters of the motto marked with electric lights, but the arch is studded with them in beautiful designs. Both sides are exact-

#### FLAG IN ELECTRICITY.

At the corner of Washington and Front is another square arch similar to the one at the lower end of the street. On its south front it has in electric lights the word, "Marquette." A trumpet and star are the electrical decorations on the west side; the other two sides are blank. An enormous flag having over 250 incandescent lights is suspended above the arch in the middle from the telephone cables. This is unquestionably the most beautiful electrical piece in the whole display.

At Washington and Third streets stands the fourth arch. This is also n white in imitation of Ionic marble. This arch has similar electrical designs on its east and west fronts, a shield between the letters U. P. F. A. and the date 1899.

From Bluff street to Rock on Front and from Fourth street to Front on Washington there are slight electrical arches spanning the street every sixty feet. The effect on the two principal thoroughfares of the city when every light is burning is something grand. For day time display there are the grand arches which present a beautiful appear-

At 3:30 comes the parade of all the companies attending the tournament. The parade is one of the most beautiful sights in connection with the tourny, and parade day, which is always first, never fails to have a big crowd.

The parade will form on Superior by the depot and go over the following streets: West on Superior to Fourth; south to Fisher; east to Front; north to Ridge: east to Pine: north to Arch; east to Cedar; south to Ridge; west to Front; south to Washington; west to the city

In front of the city hall the paraders will be lined up in a large crescent, while James Russell will address them with a few words of welcome. This will be followed by the ceremony of presenting the visitors with the key to the city, Mayor Neidhart presenting President Bowers, as the representative of the firemen, with a large bronzed steel key about two feet long and of corresponding breadth and thickness.


