In and About Negaunee.

PATANA SETTLES UP.
HE SUCCEEDED IN RAISING MONEY ENOUGH SATURDAY TO SATISFY HARRIS & MATTHEWS.

Alfred Patana, who has been held in the city lockup the past ten days awaiting a hearing before Justice Thorpe on a charge of embezzlement made by Harris & Matthews, was released Saturday, having settled with his former employers. Patana has had much sympathy here on account of his family, and among the old soldiers because he had formerly been in the regular service, and the effort of his friends to raise money enough to satisfy his employers have been constant. His father-in-law finally sent him a check from lower Michigan and Saturday he was able to offer Harris & Matthews \$200 in settlement. His offer was accepted. He also paid all costs in the case, amounting to \$25.00, and was then allowed to go free.

As it was possible that there would be much trouble in convicting Patana, owing to the obscurity of the methods by which he obtained the money embezzled, settlement of the case is satisfactory to all concerned. Harris & Matthews are to be congratulated on having got the amount they received. It is not believed that it covers Patana's embezzlement but the plundered firm is glad to get even that much under the circumstances.

HORSE IN A CELLAR.

The delivery horse belonging to the Finnish butcher firm next to Field's new building got into the cellar of the new structure yesterday morning and furnished fun and employment to many men and boys in the task of rescuing it. The horse was being hitched to the delivery wagon, preparatory to making a trip on the road. The animal broke away and leaping over a pile of rubbish, fell into an excavation below the surface of the ground which had been prepared for the reception of a stairway into the cellar of the Field building. The foundation of the building was breached for the stairway but the opening was not very large. The horse succeeded in getting through it and without much injury. When it got to its feet it ran around the cellar until stopped. The problem confronting the owners of the animal was a puzzler. There was no way of getting the horse out without great trouble. Every opening into the cellar was much smaller than the horse, which was a good sized animal. A crowd of men and boys offered all sorts of suggestions and advice and waited for developments with considerable amusement. The task of getting the animal out of his unusual position was only accomplished after several vain attempts.

AN INTERESTING CHARACTER.

The Michael Cary who was picked up by Officer Stranberg Thursday last, on whom the officer found it necessary to use his billy, is an interesting character. He is a veteran of the Spanish war, having served with Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders. After being honorably discharged from that troop he made his way to the copper country, where he has been working lately on railroad construction at good wages. When Ringling's circus went to that section his roving blood got the better of him and he joined it. Circus life was not what he expected it would be and when the show got here he jumped it and drew the little money he had coming. A drunk was the next thing in order, and he chose Negaunee as the scene of his carousal, with the result that he was taken up. On his promise to leave the city he was allowed to go when he came up for hearing.

WANT WOOD CHOPPERS.

The Cleveland Chiffs company has posters about the city advertising for wood choppers for the coming winter's work. The men are wanted to get out furnace wood. The employment is offered at Cooks Mills, which is between Gladstone and Manistique. The company will pay \$1 a cord for cutting and as the timber to be cut is clear stuff the men should have little trouble in making good wages. Board will cost the employees \$3.50 a week. Wages in the woods will be higher the coming winter than for several seasons past, and it is expected that even with the increased pay offered that there will be considerable trouble in getting men.

TWIN CITIES TIED.

Figuring on a basis of five points for firsts, five for seconds and one for thirds the Ishpeming and Negaunee track teams are tied on the records of the fifth annual firemen's tournament. Negaunee got two firsts, and a second. Ishpeming got a first, two seconds and two thirds. Each team has thirteen points and the two are therefore tied for third position in the list of the eleven teams competing.
