





The manouvering before the start was remarkably interesting. At the warning signal both yachts, with their booms to starboard and the sheets flattened well in, were sailing to the northeast, parallel to the line, but about a quarter of a mile north, with the wind a little abaft the beam. Columbia was to the windward, with Shamrock on her lee beam a couple of lengths away.

When three minutes were left Columbia luffed into the wind and then, coming about, headed for the line. Skipper Hogarth instead of tacking like Columbia, wore Shamrock sharp round on her keel, bringing her close up under Columbia's lee, both having their booms to port. Hogarth lost both time and headway, so that when Shamrock hauled up nearly on the wind Columbia, under the better headway, was pointed straight for the line a couple of lengths to the good.

Columbia crossed the line 27 seconds in the lead, without her handicap, which meant fully two lengths' distance. She crossed about the centre of the line. Captain Hogarth, after a vain attempt to luff out across her way to obtain the weather position, kept off and gave Shamrock a good full. The official time of the start was:

Columbia.... 11:01:33 Shamrock11:02:00

Hogarth, not being able to try his yacht on a reach on the triangular course, seemed determined to make a portion of the race a reach at all hazards. During the first fifteen minutes of this reaching work Columbia, seemed to increase her lead. After that, for the next half hour, Shamrock apparently was gaining on Columbia, and at 11:50, when they decided to abandon the luffing game and set the spinnakers to starboard, Shamrock had certainly gained some. It was a long drift before the wind, with scarcely enough of it to fill their sails.

At 2:20 p. m. Columbia took in her spinnaker and all hands stood by to round in the main sheet as she was approaching the mark. The official time of the turn was:

By this it will be seen that Columbia was six minutes and eighteen seconds ahead at the mark, and that her gain actually had been five minutes and fifty-one seconds in the fifteen-mile run. Captain Hogarth, who went breezehunting off to the southward for eight minutes and ten seconds, lost just about that amount of time, for when he tacked and stood to the northwest his imaginary advantage was that he was to the windward of Columbia's wake, while the latter yacht was nearly two miles ahead of him, pointing direct to the finish.

The wind was now falling lighter every moment. Shamrock was nearly
