



SESSIONS WILL LAST A MONTH. Chicago, May 2.-The twenty-ninth general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church began this morning; it lasts a month.

The auditorium theater was filled with delegates when Bishop Bowman called the conference to order in a speech counseling conservatism in the consideration of the grave matters which are to come up. After invocation and the singing of a number of hymns, Bishop greetings. Merrill took the chair, which was the first move made in the business of the

The first business of the conference was the consideration of the question regarding the admission of an equal lay representation to all Methodist conferences. It was expected there would be a big fight over this question, but when the vote was taken the result was unanimously in favor of admission. The announcement of the vote was greeted with cheers, as it was a victory in a fight waged a hundred years.

COMMITTEES ARE DOUBLED.

Dr. Davis Monroe of Pennsylvania was elected secretary of the conference. The provisional delegates by a unanimous vote were admitted to seats. While these delegates were hunting for seats, Dr. King presented a plan for organizing the standing committees on the basis of one layman and one minister from each conference, doubling the size of each committee but giving equal representation. Dr. Jacob B. Graw of New Jersey opposed the motion, while Governor Shaw of Iowa supported it. After some debate it was carried. At 2 o'clock p. m. the conference adjourned until tomorrow.

A special train on the Santa Fe took the party to Mc-Cook, Ills., and from there to Lockport the trip was made in the yacht Hinda, a number of other pleasure craft following. The admiral received a warm welcome all along the route, cannon salutes intermingling with the other
