SETS ENTRY FOR TODAY.

Lord Roberts bivouacs in the Suburbs of Johannesburg. EXPECTS NO OPPOSITION. His Cavalry Some Eight Miles North of the Town Engaging the Boer Rear Guard.

MORE REPORTS OF PEACE.

London, Tuesday, May 29.—The following dispatch was received late tonight from Lord Roberts, dated Germiston, Transvaal, 6:30 p. m. today: "We arrived here this afternoon without being seriously opposed. There were no casualties, so far as I am aware, in the main column and not many, I trust, in the cavalry and mounted infantry. "The enemy did not expect us till tomorrow and had not, therefore, carried off all their rolling stock. We have possession of the junction connecting Johannesburg, which reported quiet and no mines, I understand, have been injured. "I shall summon the commandant in the morning and if, as I expect, there is no opposition, I propose to enter town with all the troops at noon."

Germiston is a suburb to the south-east of Johannesburg, while the railway junction Lord Roberts mentions in his message to the war office probably is Elandsfontein station, further to the eastward. Additional evidence that the mines are intact comes in a message received by a mining company here today from its Johannesburg representative, dated the 28th, via Delagoa Bay, saying, "All right."

Lord Roberts' dispatch is regarded as announcing the virtual occupation of Johannesburg. Apparently the Boers have again effected a retreat, as there is no mention of any prisoners or captures except of rolling stock. There will be some little anxiety pending the actual occupation of Johannesburg, as there are rumors that the town has been mined with the intention of blowing up Lord Roberts and his staff on their entry into that place.

THIS THE SITUATION. London, Wednesday, May 29.—Lord Roberts is bivouacking in the suburbs of Johannesburg and intends to make a victorious entry at noon today. Judging from his dispatch, he must have private information regarding the disposition of the garrison in the fort, as he does not seem to expect opposition. Lord Roberts' cavalry have followed beyond Johannesburg. A portion is understood to be at Zwartkop, seven miles north of Johannesburg and within twenty miles of Pretoria.

CAVALRY HAS ONLY FIGHT. The Boers, who were expected to fight along the line of hills known as Klippriver, abandoned the eastern end of the range, near Lord Roberts' advance line, but stood their ground on the extreme right near Van Wijk's Rust, where they met General French's turning movements. The fight continued all day and the result is as yet a mere conjecture. Probably the Boer rear guard succeeded in keeping General French off and is now in the hills northwest of Johannesburg.

MANY BURGHERS QUITTING. "I doubt if Kruger can muster fifteen thousand men, as many burghers have gone to their homes. The stauncher Boers are sending their families, with wagons and stores, to the Zoutpansberg district. Whether Pretoria will be defended is uncertain, although a Pretoria message dated Sunday pictures the work of defending the capital as going on with feverish activity."

The British advance force, at this writing, is now within fifteen miles of Johannesburg.

ANNEXATION DECIDED UPON. Not a Shred of the Former Independence of the Transvaal to Remain Announces Lord Salisbury in an Important Statement. London, Tuesday, May 29.—Lord Salisbury, who was entertained at dinner this evening by the City of London Conservative association, made an important announcement regarding the government's South African policy. "The stop-the-war party have used our remonstrances were met by a resolute ultimatum to which, if the queen's government had submitted, her power, not only in South Africa, but over her colonies and dependencies would have been at an end. We were forced into the war by the action of our opponents. "I say that because we repudiated greed of territory we therefore bound ourselves never to annex any territory is a most ridiculous misconception. I dwell on this point because this matter of annexation is about to become a burning question. "We have made a tremendous sacrifice of blood and treasure in this conflict, and the only certainty of preventing a recurrence of this fearful war is to insure that never again shall such vast accumulations of armaments occur and that not a shred of the former independence of the republic shall remain. "We are not yet at the end of the war, but I shall venture to lay it down as a primary condition of any future settlement that precautions be taken of such character that such a war will never occur again. It also will be our duty to protect those native races, who have been so sorely afflicted, and at the same time so to conduct their policy that, so far as possible, there shall be a reconciliation and that every one shall be the happy members of the British empire."

Neely to attach all the property belonging to the latter that may be found in this state. The suit is brought under the orders of Attorney General Griggs. It is the intention of the government to levy upon the Neely Printing company's plant at Muncie.

AT GATES OF PEKIN. "Boxers" Now Massing in Great Force Outside the Capital. MASSACRE IS FEARED. American Minister, With the Others, Calls for Protection and Marines are Ordered Sent. CRITICAL STAGE REACHED. Shanghai, Tuesday, May 29.—The Russian minister at Peking has telegraphed asking that all the available gunboats be sent to Taku. REBELLION STILL GROWS. London, Wednesday, May 30.—The Daily Express has the following telegram from Shanghai, dated Tuesday: "The rebellion continues to grow in intensity and the gravest fears are entertained of its ultimate extent. The foreign envoys at Peking, fearing a massacre within the capital, have decided to bring up the guards of the legations. "The rebels are now massing outside of Peking and their numbers are reported to be constantly augmenting. Fresh contingents of armed malcontents are coming up almost hourly from the north. TROOPS JOINING THE REBELS. "The imperial troops who were sent to disperse the rebels found themselves hopelessly outnumbered. Several hundreds were killed and two guns and many rifles captured, after which most of the remaining troops went over to the rebels. They are now marching side by side. It is believed the Boxers have the sympathy of the entire Manchuria army in their anti-foreign crusade, and there is no doubt that they have the countenance of the empress dowager and Prince Ching. "The Belgian minister, escorted by a strong bodyguard, has gone to obtain an audience of the tsung-li-yamen, a number of his countrymen, with their families, having been cut off by the rebels at Chang Hsin Tien. RELIEF FORCE SUCCESSFUL. "The position of the missionaries is one of extreme peril unless aid is speedily forthcoming. It is feared that they will meet with the same fate as their unfortunate converts, whom the Boxers are ruthlessly murdering. "The correspondent of The Times at Peking says: "The foreign guards have been summoned by the legations and will arrive immediately. This decision is well taken. The opinion is widespread that the powers should compel China to defray the cost of the measure, which the apathy of the Chinese government necessitates. "All the French engineers and their families are reported safe. Peking, Tuesday, May 29.—A relief party has returned from Chang Hsin Tien, bringing twenty-five persons, including several women and children. WASHINGTON TAKES ACTION. Washington, May 29.—Such advices as have reached here indicate that the situation in China has assumed a very critical phase and one calculated to tax the entire resources of the Chinese government. The state department has been in close communication with Mr. Conger, our minister at Peking, and the navy department is doing its share, having placed the flagship Newark far up the Pei-Ho river, at the Taku forts, which is the nearest point to Peking a ship can reach. "The operations of the 'Boxers' are increasing in magnitude. Their depredations are no longer local and they appear to be governed in their movements by some well-settled design. They have murdered nine Methodist missionaries in one province, at the town of Pashow, and have closed in on Peking. Meanwhile the Chinese army is suspected of disloyalty, and this belief is being strengthened by the wholesale desertions of soldiers to the Boxers. CONGRER CALLS FOR HELP. Minister Conger has appealed to the state department for the protection of a marine guard for his legation. The department has promptly cabled him authorization to call upon the nearest United States naval vessels for protection; it is not known yet whether he has availed himself of the permission. The ship he would naturally look to would be the Newark, and it is assumed he has already communicated with Admiral Kempf, on board that flagship. An embarrassing feature of the situation is the cutting of communication rail between Taku and Tien Tsin and the capital, for the 'Boxers' have burned the railroad bridges, and there are probably only two courses open to the marines who wish to reach Peking—a long overland march through a hostile country and a way from supports, or a tedious voyage up the swift and shallow Pei-Ho in boats in tow of steam launches. Lansing, Mich., May 29.—The testimony in the trial of Colonel Sutton of Detroit, under indictment for complicity in the state military frauds, was completed this afternoon. The arguments begin Thursday and the case is expected to go to the jury Saturday. CHINATOWN IS QUARANTINED. PLAGUE FIGHT AT FRISCO ASSUMES A NEW PHASE. San Francisco, May 29.—At a meeting of the board of supervisors of this city held today, attended by the board of health, the Merchants' association, board of trade and other interested citizens, resolutions were passed empowering the board of health to quarantine Chinatown or any other infected section of this city and county. "The board of health has accordingly quarantined Chinatown, and that section of the city is now surrounded by a cordon of police who refuse to allow any one to pass in or out of the district unless provided with the proper permit. The quarantine order also includes the street cars. "The action of the supervisors was taken simply to reassure the residents of other sections of the country that there is no danger of the spread of the disease. The Chinese residents of the quarantined section will carry the matter into the courts with a view of having the quarantine either dissolved entirely or at least so modified as to apply to the specific places which are alleged to be infected.

NO CHANGE IN FIRE SITUATION. C. & H. SHAFTS STILL CLOSED AND DAMAGE IS UNKNOWN.

There was very little change yesterday afternoon in the fire situation at the Calumet & Hecla mine. All the shafts of the Hecla group save No. 8 have been closed and all precautions possible have been taken to prevent the flames from spreading.

It was still impossible to learn whether the fire had worked its way into any of the other shafts, although it is well to suppose that it has not because of the celerity with which most of the avenues through which it might be fanned were closed.

Gas in disagreeable quantities still exists above the surface. It works its way through in many places, but these are all sealed as soon as found and hopes are expressed of having the fire smothered out before many days.

Later—Shrewsbury in expandom expect to see Calumet & Hecla stock break below six hundred. The decreased dividend will help the fire to reduce the price of the shares.

Tonight the fire situation is still unchanged—No. 2 shaft, Hecla, is still burning, but the extent of the conflagration resulting from the underground combustion is well under check.

The South Hecla, or Black Hills shafts are working regularly. It probably will be necessary to close the Calumet mill at Lake Linden soon, but the shafts of Hecla are still in operation.

It should also be borne in mind that if necessary the shafts on the Osceola lode can be made to furnish a heavy tonnage by beginning stoping.

The indications favor several weeks' idleness in the Calumet and Hecla branches of the mine. The Rochester Fireworks company has submitted several complete programs for a Fourth of July display from which the special Fourth of July committee has been given authority to make a selection.

The advertising committee has been allotted \$300, to be used according to its own discretion. Advertising matter will be scattered about the surrounding country in sufficient quantities to advise the people of what is to take place.

W. B. Hoar has been granted the privilege of manufacturing and selling the official badge. The design is quite a pretty one. Copper, of course, enters into its make-up. It will be sold for ten cents.

Two prizes of \$50 each will be given, one for the best booth erected along the street and one for the best float, best in both instances means the most artistic.

The committee will meet again Friday evening to this week, when an effort is to be made to have passenger representatives of the different railroads present with the inducements their several companies are ready to offer for the traffic of fair week.

Wm. Kroll, the Kenton lumberman, is in the copper country. W. F. Mitchell of Marquette is making the rounds of the copper country.
